## No changes to last month's meeting notes

Tim Rোক noticed in the future agenda items there was a topic for the 'definition of integrated setting' but didn't see it anywhere on the agenda. Ann Balzell remembers being a part of this

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conversation and it was going to be an ongoing agenda item. This was specifically around competitive and integrated with WIOA (Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act) regulations and a presentation from Allison Enriquez. Acacia pointed out that we have the notes from that meeting and we could send that to him.

## **Discussion:**

### **Meeting times – Trina**

First question if this day of the month and time of day works for everyone

Jaimie is ok with shortening the meeting to two hours, Mitch agrees. Trina suggested trying it and if it doesn't seem to work, we will notice pretty quickly. Cynthia would like to leave the day of the month. Sydney agrees, since we have been meeting for so long, it would be easier to leave that alone, Bill agrees. Ross is concerned about not having enough time in a two hour meeting to get as much information. Trina responded with making sure we are prepared and able to send out the materials with plenty of advance notice, so the two hours is utilized well.

GoTo – Laurie has problems after 3pm so would prefer 1-3. Sarah Jane doesn't like the 1<sup>st</sup> Wednesday of the month, but would like to try the two hour meeting instead.

### **Data Report – Andre**

Andre would like to make it clear that this is a very rough, incomplete draft. Some of the numbers may change also, as more data comes in. The first few pages are boiler plate information and definitions. The definitions come from the settlement language, Executive Order or Oregon Developmental Disability Services (ODDS) staff.

Page 8 Employment Outcomes System (EOS):

3 major employment sources for data were used for this report –Employment Outcome System (EOS), eXPRS and VR. This report will look at three of those sets, the rest of the data will be pulled in July.

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Mitch asked if the dollar amounts are averages, how hard would it be to include the range of numbers in the averages to this report. Andre has this information if it would be helpful. Trina suggested adding this information to charts on page 12, 13 and 14. Andre is willing to add it to Chart 2 and 3.

Average hours, chart 3 – Jessica believes that the information in chart 3 is really important. One of the largest complaints from the providers is around hours, a lot of sheltered workshops are saying they are closing because of this, and Jessica said it's just not true.

Ross is wondering if there is an ability to show what people are doing who were in sheltered workshops and doing other things now. Andre is willing to look at all the people who are in Mt Angel specifically and look at those individuals and where they are billing now. Although, billing under day support activities has remained flat for the last two years. Jessica noted that 11 hours is the average rather than 25 hours. Trina is wondering if we should look at data from sheltered workshops and what people are doing now – group agrees. Trina would like to add this to the April or May agenda, to bring back the information of sheltered workshops that have closed and what the trends of those individuals are. Andre is ok with this and can publish a small report for the next cycle, he has been working on a holistic report of everyone, but this could be a smaller report, he just needs a list of all the sheltered workshops that have closed.

Sydney is wondering about the people who have just left school and how they are using their employment services, specifically the people who no longer have access to the sheltered workshops and could be accessing the employment services. Heather Lindsey pointed out that the Post School Outcomes Survey (PSO) will capture this information when it comes out. Andre also added that people will go to VR and the case will close but not go back to ODDS employment supports, so there is no way to track them ongoing. There isn't billing information for transition students. Future agenda item might be adding the education data.

Tim Rocak asked about the data around the DSA information, it looks like the data is showing this support is not increasing. Andre clarified the total hours billed. Tim would like to know where this data coming from. Andre is pulling this from the eXPRS billing data he is receiving. Page 10, chart 5 looks at supported employment services billed through eXPRS, he could add the DSA facility and DSA community to this, it would look a little busy but you would be able

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see what the trends have been since billing began in September 2014. Tim asked if we could line that up with trends before this and not just community but facility DSA also. This would be more difficult because it was before the new EOS with reliable numbers, only looked at the comprehensive waiver, there wouldn't be a good apples to apples comparison. Tim would like this to be something to watch.

Bill pointed out that we never really capture the people who aren't using the employment services (natural supports only) and only using VR services, these are the real successes. Andre pointed out that these people should be captured but not in EOS, but they come in through the employment department data and publish them into the IEP (integrated employment plan) calculations for natural supports. Bill asked if the chart on page 13 includes those people. Andre has a caveat on the bottom that this data does not include people with natural supports.. Bill is concerned because these are our greatest successes. Andre to follow up and correct as needed.

From the VR perspective, Trina talked about how they are looking at people coming in who are receiving ODDS services compared to those who have I/DD and the number is significantly higher, Trina is willing to publish this. Bill remembers that data being shared a while ago, it would be nice to compare that to this report, he agrees that is what is happening. Trina agrees that this is a good conversation to bring to this group. VR does track several disabilities and to see how the trends are happening in VR.

Jessica talked about the reports that have to be produced versus the reports that we would like to have. Andre could add to the minimum standards to the reports he has to produce, if the group thinks this is a good item that should be added to this report to keep tracking, we should do that.

Sheltered Employment – Graph 4, page 9 – Jessica would like to celebrate that we met our mark with the metrics and the settlement.

Appendix B on page 14, Andre breaks down the number by provider, one thing to point out is the large decrease with the closing of Opportunity Foundations' sheltered workshop that accounted for 118 individuals. Jessica pointed out again that she is concerned about the top providers who have a large number of people. If one of these providers closes, where will these people go? Trina asked Jessica how she would like that conversation to happen. Jessica believes this is a great group to have the conversation with several of the large providers in the room.

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The conversation always comes back to capacity, but there is a financial point where she won't be able to keep her doors open. It's not because she would like special treatment, but concerned about the people who will be impacted the most. Trina would like to take this conversation back to Employment First Steering and she believes this is the time to start this conversation. Sydney added that as a parent when you start creating rules and policies by what's right by the person, she appreciates the conversation and believes more providers would be willing to take on the individuals with significant support needs. She is concerned about creating policy and definitions around what different settings are, it's going to become unsafe for people and maybe not be able to access services as much as they could. Trina is open to how this conversation should happen. Ross suggested bringing in different organizations and advocates to talk about this to help guide the conversation.

Jaimie asked about the 8 million dollars that was supposed to be dedicated to the transformation/capacity, will this still be available.? Trina would like to bring this conversation and direct numbers back to the next meeting, this conversation has just started to happen. Acacia added that the settlement does point out where some of those funds have to be allocated, including transformation, capacity and innovation, this could be a part of the same conversation. She would also like to add that she and Lilia have had several conversations about how to get out in the field and have conversations with all the providers. She wonders if there is a need to create a different forum to have these conversations. Jessica suggested trying to add this to the ORA agenda, most of the people in this room are at that meeting and she is willing to bring her numbers. Tim asked that the conversation not happen with 50 people in the room, because the conversation could be represented by the 3-4 large organizations. Laurie Kash would also like to be included in the conversation, she would like to know what all the possible vocational avenues are. All kids who can work should work and she would like to know all the options and make sure they are ethical and meaningful to them. Jessica stated that if time was spent with Tim and Garten, she would feel represented, and she would be willing to bring a little report to this group next month. Acacia would like to add to the agenda bringing 3-4 more people together to have this conversation. Jessica stated the provider community understands the workshops are closing, there is concern about how the waiver and the settlement agreement rolled out, there is a large gap in capacity, and these providers will not meet the mark. Trina would like to try to aim for having a smaller conversation before March, but with the leg session we may have to wait until the April meeting. Acacia to set up a meeting with Sheltered

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Workshop providers and then information will be brought back to this larger group for discussion.

Andre continued with the report, page 12 talks about the complaints and grievances. There are 3 places these can come in – through Education, ODDS and VR, 0 in VR and Education. Only a few listed in ODDS, because most complaints have to go through a formal process, there is no way to capture local complaints, for example ‘someone who doesn’t like their VR counselor’. Mitch confirmed that these are formal complaints that go through a formal process. Brean pointed out that there isn’t a quick and easy way, technology wise or data collection wise to capture local complaints.

In the EOS and eXPRS data at the end of the report, Andre will also add the DSA information here.

Andre would like input on the new format, there is still some information he has to add from the settlement. If anyone has questions or would like to add more things, make sure to email Andre.

Heather Hopkins would like more data on complaints, this could be an interesting idea to see if there are any specific complaints around capacity, this might help us understand how we get to an answer. Trina would like to have this conversation, specifically around complaints, to come up with a plan on how to get this information, not just for DD but all populations. It won’t be an easy thing to capture, but Trina believes it is an important thing to address. Jessica and Andre remember some of this information in the last QA report, with the referrals from VR and placements from VR around the state.

Sydney would like to add more school age data to this report. Andre will add transition age individuals to this, 24 years or younger into these data sets. Sydney would like to look specifically at the kids who are 16 years old, or close to the age, so we know what is coming up. Andre believes we have this information and could add to this report if the group would like. Sydney asked if there was a way in the ISP (Individual Support Plan) to see this information electronically. Acacia added we can see the age, but we can’t see the career development plan in the ISP, they are in paper form.

This report is due February 29<sup>th</sup> and will be published before the next meeting.

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Tim asked about the people who were being tracked who are leaving sheltered workshops, and would like to track the 118 people leaving Opportunity Foundation. Heather Hopkins clarified that the 118 people mostly went to DSA, quite a few went into small group and integrated setting but the capacity issue comes up a lot. (EDIT 3/4/16: Seth Johnson with Opportunity Foundations clarified: that was not the case. People moved everywhere: individual/group supported employment, and community path to employment, and some chose DSA. The minority chose DSA. No one went home. The goal was to offer a real menu of choice and to leave no one behind, unless that is their choice. Most are choosing a combination of services leading to a much more varied and enriching day.) Acacia would like to look at more than one provider, each organization will handle this differently.

## **VR State Plan Review – Trina/Pete Karpa**

This plan is in draft status because the WIOA regulations are not permanent yet, there are also several other entities that have input into this plan. SRC and other stakeholder groups have to approve this plan. In the past, this plan was 150 pages and more of a historical document – this is not what was preferred this time. This will go into the unified state plan as a whole and will be shared with the state rehab council on Friday, so this is the last call for any changes. The numbers from the settlement and the EO are referenced, but not stated in this plan for supported employment. The final step for this plan is to go to the Workforce Board. Pete is willing to take emails or comments/suggestions before February 11<sup>th</sup>. The section on supported employment starts on page 38. The goal of this report is to show the strategies and goals of the state and to tell the federal government how the state plans to get there. Trina pointed out the number of counselors needed on page 21.

## **BREAK**

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## **Settlement Agreement – Trina and Acacia**

Trina asked the group how they would like to go through this document.

Ryley asked if we knew who the independent reviewer was yet. Trina responded that we are still in negotiations, no final word on when this should happen yet, but will happen soon.

Acacia would like to go through the plan and address the impactful items that are coming up soon. The most important piece of this is the Career Development Plan (CDP), this is also in the Executive Order – everyone in a sheltered workshop or in transition will have a CDP. We don't have these electronically, so these will have to be collected from each county and brokerage. Also collecting the documents from the people who are choosing not to use employment services. What would make the most sense with how to collect these CDP's and what is the appropriate way to address the providers who have not completed the CDPs by a certain time, because at any time a reviewer or the plaintiffs can ask to see all of these. Trina pointed out the definition of the CDP on page 2, and on page 13 there is a larger section that is more in depth.

Ross asked what happens with the people who already know what they want to do, do they still have to go through all the processes and the CDP? Acacia clarified that if someone already has a job or wanted more hours in their current job, this would just need to be documented in the CDP.

Trina pointed out on page 2 the definitions of competitive vs integrated. These requirements are new, before WIOA it was just integrated. Competitive includes the opportunity for benefits, integrated is relating to the environment and who they work with. Tim pointed out that the provider ownership isn't included in these definitions, but Ann responding that is part of the discussion section, so it will be interesting to see what will come out in July with the final regulations. Ann mentioned WIOA talks about working a maximize number of hours, this means 'seeking' to maximize hours. Acacia added that this settlement talks about how DHS has to adapt a policy to encourage people to work the maximum number of hours, one talks about adopting the 20 hours recommended to planning.

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Acacia and Ann talked about the 20 hour maximize of hours on page 11. Liz asked if this was a mandate, Ann clarified that it's based on the individual and will come back to choice. Trina also added that it goes beyond choice, the person's ability and capabilities as well. Acacia would like feedback on this topic specifically and how to implement this. This needs to be done first and quickly. Ross asked about people who want to work more hours, but are receiving SSDI, Acacia encouraged him to talk to his PA/SC and a benefits counselor, but this is something that needs to be addressed in policy also.

Trina talked about page 13, #2 starting in July the data as put out by this group, the EO policy group will need to be met. How do we look at this data and see the trends, as we are looking at this data and it doesn't lead to those benchmarks, what do we do?

Tim talked about the ACA (affordable care act) and the impact from that will be a barrier, he would be surprised if the average number of hours worked will creep over 20. Then you lose the top end people to bring up the bottom end people. If you have people that are very productive, they may be held down by the number of hours because of the benefits. Employers are making very active decisions around this.

Trina talked about WIOA requiring them to look at the number of rehabs. Now they have to look at people who have a job and track them several quarters afterwards. So they are thinking of how to measure those. Tim suggested a policy, they have paid people an incentive to not utilize their benefits if they have other services available to them, for example if they are eligible for Medicaid/Medicare or SSI/SSDI. Jessica would like to see more data of everyone in supported employment, determine a representative sample in a rural area, ask those people how they feel about the hours they currently have. Jaimie clarified that these questions are being asked with the CDP. Andre agreed, we just don't ask why they might want more or less hours, Jessica would like to get to the 'why' they want a change in hours.

Jaimie led us to page 14 about training and asked about the transformation grants. She would love to have a conversation about how we are going to fulfill that part of the settlement. Acacia agrees that this is an important topic and to continue this conversation. Jaimie would like have a plan in place, to set a date and how do we make this move forward. Acacia responded that there are already plans in place with transformation grants and discussions about the next round of these and maybe just need better conversation about how these grants are working, there isn't

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any reason why we can't share that with this group. Jaimie asked if there is a conversation happening if these transformation grants are appropriate for Oregon and if they are working. Acacia talked about two providers that are producing newsletters about their transformation and can be shared with the group. Acacia suggested maybe coming up with a better way to communicate how the state is doing with these grants. Mitch agrees there needs to be a conversation about how to communicate this. Heather Hopkins believes it would be helpful to ask the CDDP's and brokerages in certain areas for their feedback. Acacia asked Bill what the best way to ask people in eastern Oregon for feedback on this. Heather suggested a survey monkey and she would be happy to help distribute it. Acacia would like to take this back to steering, Cynthia would be happy to help with this also. Sarah Jane also agrees that a survey is a great idea.

Mitch talked about the Education part of the settlement. The biggest part is the data collection, specifically around the Post Outcome Survey (PSO) at 100%. The other part of the settlement Education is responsible for is the mock sheltered workshop activities. Other than that there isn't really a significant impact on the educational side. What is being asked of Education isn't nearly as significant as what VR and DD is being asked to do.

Jessica asked about the survey that providers are having to complete about how to transform and transition and how this conversation is overlapping with that. Acacia clarified that the survey being sent out to providers will capture more of the plans and ideas.

Tim is concerned about the things that the settlement doesn't say, like the definition of an integrated setting. Are we as the state trying to define things a little too closely? Acacia agrees that the state of Oregon is going above and beyond what the settlement agreement is saying, but also pointed out that it's not going above and beyond the new waivers with HCBS and WIOA, so the language is coming from that language to align as much as we can with the federal language. Tim acknowledged that the state is trying to align with a moving target. Acacia agrees that it does feel like the state is going around and around, but this group and the internal groups have talked about how Oregon sets the standard where we know we are in compliance with the federal government, so we don't have to go back and forth any more. This includes tough conversations, for example looking at aligning DSA and creating sustainable funding.

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Tim agrees that we should be a state that doesn't allow the federal government to tell us what to do and to set our own standard. But does get impatient in the provider community to have guidance that doesn't lead back to a federal rule. More information can be provided, as there is federal language specific to the requirements for integration.

Corissa talked about the concept of the evidence based practices and the best practices. We need to continue to talk about how to spend that 8 million dollars, Mike and her took that budget to steering, but as we continue to evaluate these things as we go forward and to keep in mind the evidence based and best practices. Acacia agrees that this does raise a lot of good questions.

## **Transportation - Acacia**

Acacia would like to have a conversation about the things that are working and not working.

Angela also wrote this out on the projected screen and for GoTo meeting.

Ross talked about CARTS with Cherry Lift, this does work in his area, but there are things about it that doesn't work. It doesn't work for him going from Mt Angel to Salem, because they don't go everywhere and don't run on the weekends. Taking a taxi is expensive if they have to wait for you.

Jessica talked about the vans that have worked with Ride Connections. A barrier in the metro area is breaking into the tri met system. With LIFT, she often has people who show up way before the businesses open and/or show up late.

Group talked about Uber, it doesn't seem to be available anywhere but Portland. Jessica pointed out that in order to be reimbursed for the travel, they would have to meet a lot of thresholds. Insurance becomes a concern also. Acacia talked about carpooling and the different regulations that makes this complicated. Cynthia talked about a card that could have a certain amount for transportation, something like an Oregon Trail card.

Bill pointed out that every taxi service is an independent business, and we can't ask them to change their entire business to work a certain way for the state. We should pay them the way the

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get paid, we can't ask them to use something like xPRS. Acacia has heard this a lot also. Sarah Jane asked if the provider providing transportation has to complete a background check. Acacia talked about a conversation that happened recently, we would have to look at this, because liability becomes a concern. The same with Uber.

Ross asked why everyone is concerned about liability, when the debit card system could pay the fees. This would be a much simpler way. Acacia is concerned about how complicated this system would be to set up, she has heard different requests for this system, is there another idea?

Tim talked about an informal way, to just slip someone \$10 every time they give you a ride. He also talked about how Salem/Keizer transit just hired some individuals from their summer youth program as their ambassadors to help look for people who need help with how to ride the buses. There might be other transit programs in other areas that would be willing to be a part of this. Liz added that this is a huge help and a huge cost saving in Eugene also. They also hire people with I/DD to train people with I/DD on how to use the bus.

Sydney asked if there was a way to partner with the aging population, she is wondering how they go about this. Acacia has looked into this, APD is using this as a waiver through a brokerage. They also have a volunteer program, she would like to tap into these more.

Sarah Jane believes that a barrier in rural areas is the amount of reimbursement allowed for mileage or flat agency rate which is not cost effective. She also talked about change of boundaries in the Damascus area where they stopped providing transportation all together.

Liz knows that people on Medicaid get up to 12 non-medical rides per month. This would be a good start.

Acacia knows that xPRS is a big issue and can be fixed, she asked if there was anything else.

Julie asked if Tim had heard about the transportation topic with the chamber of commerce. Tim responded, they are asking for other solutions and asking for a state wide plan, but they have put forward another plan to expand transportation. There are various opinions about what will actually happen.

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Jessica suggested doing a quick search to see what other states are doing, there are plenty of other rural areas in other states. Acacia agreed with this. Acacia recapped the ideas she has heard – Uber, taxi cab, credit card system or other, how do we effectively pay those providers.

Ross just wants a way for the individuals to have the funds to pay for these services like TriMet. If it is put back on the individual, this could also teach them money handling skills and self-determination as well.

Jessica and Sydney would like to partner with VR to help purchase vehicles, help them get training and launched so people with I/DD could drive people with I/DD and elderly.

Acacia is also looking at a transportation rule and will take it to other stakeholder groups.

Tim asked where the transportation funding lies, it's not clear to him what his expectations are any more. Acacia clarified that, while receiving services, it is the provider's responsibility, getting to and from the location is not their responsibility. But agrees there needs to be a clear rule where providers could easier reference.

Jessica had another idea, to utilize the foster and residential care providers since they are transporting people anyways.

Acacia will take this to other stakeholder groups and bring back to this group.
