




I can purchase textbooks in time for the first day of classes?




The availability of my financial aid has affected my ability to purchase textbooks before the start of class?



My financial aid...





pays for all my textbook costs.

Other Interesting Pieces?

- **54%** of the 9000+ respondents were CC students
- **46%** were 4 year university students
- Of the 54% CC students half were from PCC
- Of the 46% university students 85% were from PSU
- 1/3 of the students **DO NOT** acquire their books before the first day of class
- 1/3 of the students **need their financial aid award** before they can buy their books
- Nearly 1/2 of the students are **paying over \$250 per term** for their books
- 40% buy their books from the **campus bookstore**
- 40% buy them online at sites such as **Amazon**
- Only 2% of the students utilize a **school library book loan** program
- 472 of the respondents were TRU students 85% of those were from SOU.

Common Themes...

- "Bundling" of textbooks and the purchase of required access codes.
- The quality of OERs, including time needed to develop and overall quality of final product
- Faculty commitment to using an edition for several years as a potential solution.
- Development of collaborative solutions, re textbook exchanges, common textbook adoptions, etc.
- Limited availability of textbooks for checkout at school libraries.

Next Steps

Feb. 11, 2015 (am): Statewide Textbook Regional Convening

- Final convening of stakeholders to conduct SWOT Analysis of identified promising practices
- Create criteria for promising practices to be placed into a measurable matrix to incentivize textbook choices
- Representatives from:

 - Bookstores


