Oregon Commission on Hispanic Affairs Statement on Supreme Court Opinion Today

Today's decision is an important one for the state of Oregon. The Court has rejected Arizona's stringent immigration restrictions on preemption grounds. The Court's opinion today reminds states to operate within the framework of existing federal immigration laws and that the Constitution protects all individuals. By extension, the opinion validates Oregon's commitment to fairness and growth.

The Oregon Commission on Hispanic Affairs (OCHA) is proud to be in a state where the leaders and constituents are committed to inclusion and diversity.
