**Description of Artifacts/Features:**

The site is a small scatter of historic-period artifacts including hole-in-cap cans (pre-1920), matchstick-filler or hole-in-top cans (early to mid-twentieth century), fragments of amethyst bottle glass (late-nineteenth to early-twentieth century), an aqua Lea & Perrins Worcestershire sauce bottle stopper (late-nineteenth to early-twentieth century), and non-diagnostic whiteware ceramic fragments. The artifacts were scattered across a basalt outcrop with the greatest concentration in the southeast quarter of the site.

- A Discussion:** The site is not known to be associated with any specific events in American history, nor is it associated with a pattern of events that made a significant contribution to the development of the area.
- B Discussion:** The site is not associated with the lives of persons whose achievements are demonstrably important within a local, state, or regional context.
- C Discussion:** These historic-period materials are types that are commonly found in trash dump sites that may be associated with a homestead or a casual trash disposal area.

The items found at the site do not retain integrity of design and do not have intrinsic integrity of setting, workmanship, feeling, or association.
