**I. CALL TO ORDER AND INTRODUCTIONS**

Chair Chuck Hayes called the meeting to order and introductions were made. Chair Hayes asked for a moment of silence in remembrance of the cause of reducing impaired driving related deaths and injuries in Oregon.

**II. CHAIR REPORT**

Chair Hayes reported that Cate Duke has been appointed to the Committee. He distributed copies of two articles entitled "*Economic Impact of Reducing Alcohol-Related Crashes*" and "*U.S. Government Report on Drug-Impaired Driving*". He further mentioned the research from the Preusser Research Group entitled "*Evaluation of State Ignition Interlock Programs: Interlock Use Analyses from 28 States, 2006–2011*". He will have copies of Oregon's report from this document at the next meeting. Lastly, he gave a report on impaired driving conferences he has attended in other states. Discussion ensued.

**III. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETINGS**

Chair Hayes asked if there were any additions or changes to the April 10, 2015 meeting minutes.

**MOTION:** Teresa Douglas moved to approve the April 10, 2015 meeting minutes as submitted. Terry Timeus seconded the motion. With no further discussion, the motion passed unanimously.

Chair Hayes asked if there were any additions or changes to the May 1, 2015 meeting minutes.

**MOTION: Connie Cabrera moved to approve the May 1, 2015 meeting minutes as submitted. Cate Duke seconded the motion. With no further discussion, the motion passed unanimously.**

#### **IV. 2015 LEGISLATIVE SESSION**

Dan Estes gave an update on the 2015 legislative session. Along with giving an update on legislation that has either been signed into law or are no longer being considered, he reported that the omnibus ignition interlock bill, SB 397, will be up for a floor vote soon. Chair Hayes mentioned that he would like to build a one to two page fact sheet for ignition interlock devices in Oregon (similar to what the Committee did for marijuana and driving). He asked that members and liaisons send their ideas to Mr. Estes, Rachelle Nelson or himself prior to the July meeting. Discussion ensued.

#### **V. TSD REPORT**

Mr. Estes reported that there are staff changes at the Transportation Safety Division. He further shared that there is a multi-agency education effort in place for the Fourth of July weekend in Seaside. He is also working with the Oregon Liquor Control Commission on an education effort during the college football season. He further shared that he and Chair Hayes are working on planning a strategic retreat session on impaired driving.

Ms. Nelson shared that there will be a statewide transportation safety conference on October 19 – 20, 2015 at the Embassy Suites – Washington Square.

Troy Costales reported that there is a national push to re-emphasize 24/7 law enforcement patrol.

#### **VI. 2016 OREGON TRAFFIC SAFETY PERFORMANCE PLAN**

Chair Hayes asked the Committee to review the impaired driving pages of the 2016 Oregon Traffic Safety Performance Plan.

**MOTION: Ms. Douglas moved that the Committee endorse the impaired driving – alcohol pages of the 2016 Oregon Traffic Safety Performance Plan. Ms. Duke seconded the motion. With no further discussion, the motion passed unanimously.**

**MOTION: Ms. Duke moved that the Committee endorse the impaired driving – drugs pages of the 2016 Oregon Traffic Safety Performance Plan. Ms. Cabrera seconded the motion. With no further discussion, the motion passed unanimously.**

## **VII. AGENCY LIAISONS**

### Addictions and Mental Health Division

Jeff Ruscoe reported that the Oregon Health Authority has a new Director. He shared that they are undergoing a reorganization of the agency and are currently under a hiring freeze.

### Department of Public Safety Standards and Training

David Beatty shared that he has been conducting trainings for the Intoxilizer 8000. He also reported that they have been revising the Standardized Field Sobriety Testing refresher curriculum. They have added two additional sections; one on ignition interlock device laws and one on marijuana DUII enforcement. Discussion ensued.

### Driver and Motor Vehicle Services

Mary Grosso reported that the DMV has a new division called the Service Transformation Program. She also shared that a small project of receiving electronic convictions from several courts went live as of June 1, 2015. She further reminded the Committee that the new administrative rules for ignition interlock devices went into effect on June 1, 2015.

### Multi-Disciplinary Task Force

Robert Hayes reported that there were 325 attendees at the 2015 DUII Multi-Disciplinary Training Conference. The 2016 DUII Multi-Disciplinary Training Conference is scheduled to be held April 21 – 22, 2016 in Bend, Oregon. Discussion ensued.

### Oregon Liquor Control Commission

James Lynch reported that his division of the OLCC is undergoing reorganization. The OLCC plans to hire thirteen officers by July 1, 2015 in order to be prepared for the legalization of marijuana going into effect. He further shared that they are doing an educational event for the Fourth of July in Seaside, Oregon. Discussion ensued.

### Oregon State Police

Evan Sether reported that the 2014 Drug Recognition Expert annual report has been finalized. There were 1226 enforcement evaluations and 11 training evaluations during the field certifications process. He shared that poly-drug use was found 53% of the time and marijuana was used over 50% of the time. Narcotics, depressants and stimulants were all significantly represented as well. The academic portion of the May 2015 DRE School has been completed and field certifications are scheduled for the end of June. The second DRE School is scheduled for August. He further reported that the Oregon Country Fair will be held July 10 – 12, 2015 in Veneta, Oregon. There will be a DUII/DRE saturation patrol for that event. He further reported that the OSP has been in meetings with the Oregon Association of Hospitals and Health Systems to minimize conflicts for blood and urine collection for crashes and DUII cases. The OSP continues to have meetings with the Oregon Association of Hospitals and Health Systems regarding search warrant procedures. Sgt. Sether further reported that the OSP is increasing the number of Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement classes.

Lastly, a couple of DREs are teaming up with treatment professionals and DUII victims to conduct a parent education night in Eugene, Oregon.

Greg Plummer shared that there are preparations being made for the Fourth of July holiday weekend. He reported that the OSP is heavily involved in the Seaside education event. There will be a Mobile Response Team working that area during that time frame. He is also in the final process of putting together a marijuana impairment training bulletin to be sent out to the OSP prior to July 1, 2015.

Robert Jones reported that they have a signed contract for their mass spectrometer and should have it in the laboratory within a month. Discussion ensued.

#### Oregon State Sheriff's Association

Marianne Novotny reported that the OSSA recorded eighteen DUII arrests over the Memorial Day weekend.

#### Oregon Transportation Safety Committee

Mike Laverty reported that Oregon leads the nation for safety belt use with a usage rate of 97.8% in 2014. He further shared that since October 2014 there has been an increase in fatality crashes across the state. He also stated that as of June 2, 2015, there have been fourteen motorcycle fatalities. Discussion ensued.

#### Traffic Safety Resource Prosecutor

Deena Ryerson shared that they are putting on the Lethal Weapon Course this year in conjunction with a crash conference. She further reported that she is working with Sgt. Sether to launch a webinar designed to provide education on marijuana impairment. Discussion ensued.

#### Not on the Agenda – Safety Nightlife Advocacy Partnership

Shelley Campbell reported that the Safety Nightlife Advocacy Partnership has divided into two groups; one of which will be focusing on educating bar owners and servers. The other is a new coalition based out of Multnomah County that will focus on educating youth. Discussion ensued.

### **VIII. OLD BUSINESS**

#### Transportation Safety Action Plan Policy Advisory Committee Update

Chair Hayes gave an update on the TSAP PAC. They are working on developing a mission statement, goals and reviewing data.

#### Traffic Injury Research Foundation Report

Chair Hayes asked members to fill out the questionnaire from pages 16 to 34 of the DWI Dashboard. He further requested that liaisons and guests do the same. Mr. Estes will then tabulate all the responses that are received.

### **IX. NEW BUSINESS**

No new business was brought before the Committee at this time.

**X. ADJOURN**
