Please remember...

First 120 Days in ODOC: You must be in ODOC custody for 120 calendar days before earning PRAS points. That begins the day you enter Coffee Creek Correctional Facility (CCCF). For example, if you arrived at CCCF on February 1, 2012 and started working at EOCI on April 1, that would be a total of 60 days, requiring another 60 days before you start earning points (on May 31).

30-Day Evaluation Period: You must first successfully complete 30 Daily Pass days in a work assignment or non-work program before earning PRAS points.

30-Day Disciplinary Sanction Period: If you are placed in the Disciplinary Segregation Unit (DSU) due to disciplinary sanction, upon returning to a work assignment or non-work program, you must successfully complete 30 Daily Pass days before earning PRAS points—even if your violations have been dropped to minimum. This is in addition to the periods described above and also applies to inmates who receive a Program Failure for failing to meet the work assignment or non-work program requirements. •





Do I need to file taxes while I'm in prison?

The same rules for filing a tax return that apply to you outside of prison still apply while you're in prison. You must file a tax return if your gross income* for the tax year is over the filing requirements set by law (see chart below).

For example, a tax return may be necessary if you:

- Worked part of the year and were in prison part of the year.
- Received income while in prison, such as: retirement income, investment income, or alimony payments.

Taxable Income

These are examples only. For complete information see IRS Pub 525.

- Employee compensation, such as wages, salaries, commissions, fees, and tips.
- Miscellaneous compensation such as bonuses, severance pay, and sick pay.
- Business income (partnerships, S Corporations, self-employed) (see IRS Pubs 541 & 334).
- Unemployment benefits.
- Alimony received (see IRS Pub 504).
- Retirement income (distributions, pensions, annuities) (see IRS Pub 575).
- Investment income (interest, dividends, capital gains) (see IRS Pub 550).
- Gambling Winnings.
- Some Social Security benefits (see IRS Pub 915) (Social Security is not taxed by Oregon, but may be taxed by the IRS).
- Rental property income (see IRS Pub 527).

Do I need to file?

You need to file if your gross income is more than the amount shown below for your filing status.

In addition, file a return if:

- You are required to file a federal return.
- You had \$1 or more of Oregon income tax withheld from your wages.

* The larger of \$1,000, or your earned income plus \$350, up to the standard deduction amount for your filing status.

Nontaxable Income

These are examples only. For complete information see IRS Pub 525.

- Veterans' benefits such as disability pay or pension pay for disabilities paid to veterans or their families, veterans' insurance proceeds and dividends, and allowances for education, training, and subsistence.
- Qualified combat pay (see IRS Pub 3).
- Governmental benefit payments from a public welfare fund.
- Child support payments received.
- Medicare benefits.

* Gross income is all income you receive in the form of money, goods, property, and services, unless that income is nontaxable.

How to File & Tips for Filing

- Get the appropriate forms and instructions (i.e. IRS Form 1040 and Form 40, *Oregon Individual Income Tax Return*, 150-101-040) from a trusted source. The institution is unable to provide these forms.
- You may appoint a qualified person as your Power of Attorney (POA) and have them file your tax return for you. Make sure to choose a person you trust to be your POA.
- Don't disclose your Social Security Number (SSN) to others or let someone use your SSN for fraud. If fraud occurs, it will take a lot of work for you to clean up your account once you're out of prison.
- Request your W-2 from your employer if you didn't receive it.
- The award amount you receive for your work assignment as an inmate is taxable income. You will receive a form 1099-Misc.
- Be aware that the award amount received for work performed as an inmate does not qualify as earned income when calculating your Earned Income Tax Credit.
- If you have a filing requirement, file or request an extension by April 15, 2015.



Short-Term Transitional Leave Information

Do I meet criteria for Short-Term Transitional Leave (STTL)?

If you see “TL eligible” with a date on the upper left side of your face sheet, it means you have met initial eligibility requirements for STTL – not that you will necessarily release to STTL. (If you do not meet these initial requirements, “not eligible for transitional leave” will be displayed on your face sheet.)

The Short-Term Transitional Leave Eligibility Date (SED) is the earliest date you could start STTL, if approved. Which means you may get to go out on leave and you need to start thinking about how to prepare for your meeting with your Release Counselor. Note: If approved for STTL, your custody level must be 1 or 2 to participate.

How long is STTL?

If you are eligible to participate in STTL, the length of STTL is determined by when you were sentenced. If you were sentenced prior to 8/1/2013, you might be eligible for up to 30 days of STTL. If you were sentenced on or after 8/1/2013, you might be eligible for up to 90 days of STTL.

How do I prepare for my meeting with my Release Counselor?

Your first step is to make sure you complete all treatment/work as directed and continue to behave in a prosocial manner. Remember, STTL is an incentive-based opportunity.

If you earn a level 1 or 2 misconduct report *or* a program fail (FOCP) within 12 months of your Short-Term Transitional Leave Eligibility Date (SED), you will no longer be eligible for STTL. For example, if your SED is 12/1/15 and you receive a FOCP on 1/30/15, you will not be eligible for any STTL.

While you can be referred for STTL when it is expected that your medium custody level will drop to a minimum custody level prior to STTL, you cannot participate in STTL until your custody level is officially 1 or 2 in the system.

You will be required to sign STTL conditions prior to leave. If you refuse to sign STTL conditions, your STTL will be denied.

Please be aware your behavior will impact your ability to participate in leave, even if you meet the basic criteria. If ODOC or Community Corrections have significant concerns about your behavior, your STTL will be denied.

Your second step is to prepare release addresses prior to meeting with your Release Counselor.

Due to the number of people participating in leave and the processing time for staff regarding leave, addresses/waivers for STTL will be limited to what is provided on the initial release plan. Addresses provided after the plan is sent out will not be considered for STTL.

A waiver request to another county will require a private address.

Some counties do not provide subsidized housing for STTL. Maintaining housing is a requirement of STTL. You cannot release to STTL without approved


housing, and you will be returned to ODOC if you lose your housing while on leave.

If you decide not to participate in STTL, your decision stands. You will not be considered for STTL at a later date if you change your mind.

You must choose between applying for interstate compact upon release from incarceration OR participating in STTL. If you decide to apply for interstate compact and the compact is denied, you will not be allowed to participate in STTL. If your STTL is denied, you will not be reconsidered for STTL.

Lastly, it is important you address detainers and unresolved pending charges (listed as “other charges” on your face sheet) through your facility’s legal library early in your incarceration. It is often too late to resolve these issues if you wait until the end of your incarceration.

Unresolved pending charges (also known as “Other Charges”) must be converted to “cite to appear” in the ODOC computer system.

Detainers with an expiration date before your projected release date must officially expire.

It is your responsibility to follow through with the courts by working with the legal assistant in the legal library. The earlier you start this process, the better.

Documentation regarding detainers and “other charges” must be processed through proper channels – ODOC will not accept documentation from adults in custody.

What is expected of me during Short-Term Transitional Leave (STTL)?

STTL is a privilege and with privilege comes responsibility. If you are approved for STTL, you will be required to comply with all of your Parole Officer’s (PO’s) directives and expectations – including where to live.

Please be aware if you violate STTL conditions, you might be returned to ODOC, spend a significant amount of time in the county jail, lose earned time credit, and/or repay extradition costs.

If you lose your housing, you will be returned to ODOC. Additionally, if you lose your housing due to your behavior, you will be considered out of compliance with your PO’s directives and are subject to all of the consequences discussed above.

My Short-Term Transitional Leave (STTL) was denied. How do I ask for an administrative review?

If your STTL was denied due to ODOC’s or a County’s decision, you can ask for an administrative review by writing a letter to the ODOC Assistant Director of Community Corrections, Jeremiah Stromberg.

If you are not eligible for STTL due to a program fail, misconduct, or custody level, the STTL office cannot override these factors. Please address these issues at the institution level following the usual procedure.

The STTL office cannot override factors that make you ineligible for STTL, such as your crime, judgment order, or open warrants. Address your concerns to the courts (or in cases of sex-offender status, the Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision) through the law library.



Fee Increase for Inmate Trust Account Deposits

Trust Account Deposits Only – Deposits to Telephone Accounts Unchanged

During the last 16 months, ODOC has been working Telmate to negotiate new fees for inmate trust account deposits. On December 1, 2015, a fee change took effect for Telmate trust deposits (see chart below). The fee structure is now a tiered model. Under the new structure, the fee for cash deposits for any amount up to \$300 is \$4.50. The fee for online deposits, kiosk credit card deposits, and deposits over the phone will be \$4.50 for deposits of less than \$20, with the fee increasing up to the maximum deposit amount of \$300.

This model aligns with the deposit fees of ODOC's other vendors JPay and Access Corrections. Please note that this fee structure applies only to deposits to inmate trust accounts. There is no fee for deposits to Telmate telephone accounts.

- You must have resided in the correctional system for a period of at least one year.
- You must have at least 12 months remaining at EOCI from the beginning of the term for which you are applying.
- You must have a valid GED or high school diploma.
- You must have maintained a good conduct record for the last six months.
- You must have a good inmate work record.
- You must be able to pay a tuition fee of \$10.00 per credit hour (usually totaling \$40.00 per quarter).
- You must be willing to take the COMPASS College Placement Test and score at a college skill level.
- You must not be classified as minimum custody.
- You must not be employed at the EOCI Call Center.
- Are able to be off your job by 2:45p for school and would like to be chosen to become a student in the New Directions Education Project, please send a letter requesting an application form to the following address:

This form will explain to you the next steps necessary to apply for admission. All application forms must be filled out completely and all necessary papers returned to the above address by February 5, 2016.

Movie Donations

Step-by-step instructions for getting movies donated to the EOCI Movie Library

1. Send an Inmate Communication Form to the Multi Sergeant with the title, year, and rating of the movie you wish to donate.
2. Staff determines if the movie is on the SWANK-approved list and whether it is already in the institution approved database and in the EOCI Movie Library.
3. If the movie is SWANK-approved but not in the Movie Library, it is sent to the Operations Captain for approval, who notifies the Assistant Superintendent of General Services of the approval or denial.
4. Multi staff sends notification of approval or denial to the inmate of the movie's approval or denial. If it is approved, staff adds to the movie database.
5. The inmate may order the approved movie DVD(s) through an approved vendor or ask someone on the outside to do so.

Important

- ✓ Do not order or ask someone else to order any movie prior until you are notified of its approval.
- ✓ New or used, all movie DVDs must come from an approved vendor (e.g., Amazon.com, Walmart.com, Fred Meyer.com, etc.), not a private party.
- ✓ Donations to the Movie Library must be sent directly from the movie vendor and must be addressed exactly as appears below:



- ✓ All donated movies become the property of ODOC/EOCI, not of the inmate who asked to have them donated.
- ✓ No inmate SID or name is to appear on the packages. Packages addressed to an inmate or SID number will be returned to the sender.
- ✓ Because some versions of the same film title may have different ratings, the inmate must notify anyone on the outside who is ordering a DVD that it must exactly match the approved title, version, and rating. For example, the R-rated version of "True Romance" is approved, while the unrated director's cut is not.
- ✓ Movie DVDs that are sent to EOCI without prior approval or those of a different version or rating will be disposed of. ●







"40 Days in The Word"

"40 Days in the Word" is a teaching series and small group curriculum created by Pastor Rick Warren, noted author of *The Purpose Driven Life*.


Christmas Choral Concert

2. "Am I practicing an old way of living and setting myself up for failure?"
