Serving Oregonians for 40 years

As a statewide resource for Oregonians, the Oregon Department of Energy implements and promotes policies and programs to encourage investment in conservation, energy efficiency, and renewable energy. With programs for homeowners, businesses, tribes, schools, and public agencies, ODOE helps Oregonians save energy and money. In addition to incentives, ODOE offers an energy loan program, which supports conservation and renewable energy projects, and works on energy policy issues like climate change, emerging technologies, and emergency preparedness for the state.

ODOE helps Oregon residents save energy and money.

- Residential energy tax credits and rebates available.
- Through ODOE programs, Oregon residents have saved enough energy to power more than 400,000 households for one year.

ODOE helps Oregon schools, governments, and businesses with incentives for alternative fuel vehicle infrastructure and fleets.

- Transportation program offers tax credits for projects such as alternative fuel vehicle infrastructure and fleet conversions, capped at \$20M per biennium.

ODOE invests in and supports renewable energy and conservation.

- Renewable Energy Development grants support renewable electricity generation – such as solar and hydro – through a competitive selection process.
- Grants for renewable energy development capped at \$3M per biennium.
- Energy conservation projects support commercial buildings, agriculture, and industrial processes – from lighting to irrigation to building retrofits.
- Tax credits for energy conservation projects capped at \$28M per biennium.

Who qualifies?


Businesses, residents, nonprofits, schools and tribes that have a qualifying project in Oregon can compete for most program incentives.

What is the application process?

Some incentives are granted through a competitive application process, while others are offered first-come, first-served. For all incentive programs, ODOE posts an opportunity announcement on our website with instructions, application fees, and deadlines, if applicable. Applications are reviewed for completeness; a technical review follows. ODOE inspects projects before tax credits or grants receive final approval.
