



## Lane County's Coordinated Care Organization is Trillium.

We are focused on improving health through the quality of care and increasing access to care for Oregon Health Plan members. We serve 90,000 OHP members in Lane County. Half of all children in Lane County are enrolled in the Oregon Health Plan and Trillium has added 37,000 new members since January 2014.


## CHIPing in for Improvement

Community members, Lane County Public Health, PeaceHealth, the United Way of Lane County, and Trillium all chipped in to develop the local CHIP plan for Lane County. It was a collaborative effort that started with an extensive community health assessment and a planning process from May 2012 - April 2013.

The process included:

- ▶ Outreach to Community Groups
- ▶ Public forums
- ▶ Public Official Interviews
- ▶ Focus Groups
- ▶ Key Stakeholder Interviews
- ▶ Surveys - On and Offline

## Community Health Plan Priorities

- ▶ Slow the Increase of Obesity
- ▶ Prevent and Reduce Substance Abuse and Mental Illness

## The Number One Cause

Tobacco use is the number one cause of preventable death in Lane County with treatment costing Medicaid millions of dollars. The Good Behavior Game is a classroom management tool that has been demonstrated to improve multiple behavioral and physical health outcomes for children who play the game in first grade, including up to a 50% reduction in tobacco use initiation.

**215 elementary teachers have been trained  
14 out of 16 school districts in Lane County

## Success through Access

Since January 1, 2014, Trillium has added approximately 37,000 new OHP members. This dramatic influx of new members put significant stress on the delivery system. Trillium responded with a Four Point Plan to increase provider access.

- 1) Increase payments to PCP's to cover costs of new member intakes.
- 2) A \$900,000 grant funding to help Lane County open a fifth Community Health Clinic with a capacity to serve 6,000 adult OHP members. The Brookside Clinic opened August 25, 2014.
- 3) Award grants to practices willing to redesign their practice to create additional capacity and accept additional OHP members. Several practices have been awarded grants, resulting in access for an additional 3,500 members.
- 4) Assist 13 local medical clinics to help practices achieve targeted quality outcomes and transform into highly functioning patient-centered medical homes, using TransforMED.

## Slow The Increase of Obesity

Obesity is the second leading cause of preventable death in Lane County. Student obesity increased by 58% for 8th graders and 55% for 11th graders.



The Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment for Childcare Providers (NAP-SACC) assesses childcare providers on nutrition and physical activity. Providers do a self-assessment, and then receive training in best practices to increase physical activity, reduce screen time and improve nutrition. Over 140 childcare providers have participated, reaching about 700 children.

Collecting Body Mass Index (BMI) from school children helps determine the rate of obesity and creates a baseline for efforts to change the rate. BMI screening in elementary schools with 50% or higher enrollment in the free/reduced lunch program is being implemented in 19-24 schools during the 2014 to 2015 school year.
