OHP Update

- More than 302,000 Oregonians gained coverage since Jan. 1 (through April 2014)
- More than 935,000 Oregonians on the Oregon Health Plan (through April 2014)
- ~90% in one of 16 CCOs (coordinated care organizations)
- Metrics: Full data for calendar year 2013 will be reported in late June

February Progress Report Highlights

(Nine months of data)

- ✓ Emergency Department utilization down 13% since 2011
- ✓ Hospital readmissions down 8%
- ✓ Reduced hospital admissions for congestive heart failure by 32 percent, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease by 36 percent and adult asthma by 18 percent.
- ✓ CCO primary care visits up 16%
- ✓ Patient-centered primary care home enrollment increased 51% (since 2012)

Coordinated Care Model

- Using best practices
- Sharing responsibility for health

Coming next for Health Systems Transformation

- PEBB – newly awarded 2015 contracts with health plans committed to meeting the coordinated care model and hold down cost growth
- OEBC – existing health plans recently renewed contracts to include care coordination elements; RFP in Fall of 2015 will require care coordination elements for new health plans beginning Oct 2016
- OID- initial set of new metrics and measurement standards identified to promote market-wide transparency and alignment; for 2015, carriers will be including metrics with their rate filings for informational purposes
