Jesse Sweet, Administrative Policy and Process Division presented. There were four licensing stipulated settlement agreements before the Commissioners for ratification; Saithong Thai, Eazy A Market, Gtano's and Sube.

The applicant for Saithong Thai was present at the meeting. There were no questions for the applicant.

Commissioner Révoal moved to ratify the four licensing settlement agreements as listed.

### **LICENSE MATTERS**

Dan Croy, Licensing Division presented.

#### **Casey's 412 SW 4th Ave. Portland**

The City of Portland gave an unfavorable recommendation due to the premise being located in a problem area. Staff found the premise was in a problem area but found good cause to overcome the fact. Good cause is the applicants control plan and applicants experience in operating a similar business also located in a problem area. Staff found no reason for restrictions. Applicant Karl Wilgus was present.

Chairman Patridge thanked staff for the thorough investigation. While he understands the cities concern, he believes we need to give this proven operator a chance. Commissioner Harper asked the applicant to come forward and clarify if this would be a second location. Mr. Karl Wilgus said they are closing the old location and moving to the new location. Mr. Wilgus told the Commissioners he trains his staff to take a proactive approach to ward off problems. At his old location, he locked his bathrooms in order to keep people from hiding drugs in the bathrooms. Commissioner Révoal moved to approve the license application for Casey's.

Chairman Patridge said we are trying to work through these issues with the City of Portland. Mr. Patridge would like staff to use this case as an example to talk through with the city and gain clarity on their policies when it is a person who has been licensed in a similar business and in a similar area, what is there reasoning behind the negative endorsement.

#### **Toor Food Market, 486 East Main St. Estacada**

The City of Estacada gave an unfavorable recommendation on Mr. Toor's poor record of compliance and record of convictions. Staff found that passage of time was good cause to overcome both of the facts. Commissioner Harper and Chairman Patridge asked clarifying questions about the licensing criteria related to passage of time. Mr. Croy explained the length of time with no bad experiences is good cause.

Commissioner Weatherspoon moved to approve the license application for Toor Food Market.

Anna Davis presented at the administrative hearing and before the commission meeting.

Licensee Kwin Chun Park and her attorney Michael Mills appeared before the commission.

Mr. Mills spoke to his exceptions; Ms. Davis did not file comments. Mr. Mills said at the time, his client had only been arrested and not convicted. He also noted even if the licensee had listed her arrest, there would have been no basis for suspending or canceling her license. Mr. Mills did not dispute the charges but rather requested a reduced fine and suspension. Ms. Davis clarified that the renewal application asks if a person has been arrested and/or convicted. Chairman Patridge said for the record, he will follow the law but if he had the ability, he would revoke her license because the illegal spice product she had on her shelf for sale is dangerous and he has seen its effects.

**Jennifer Cloutier**

Ms. McNeal said that based on passage of time, Ms. Cloutier will be eligible to receive her service permit in four days on 4/29/2014. Ms. Cloutier appeared by phone where she told the commission the steps she has taken to stay sober.

**Rachel Strom**

Ms. McNeal said that Ms. Strom will be eligible to receive her service permit when she has 24 months of sobriety and is off of probation or based on passage of time, on 6/28/2015. Ms. Strom appeared by phone where she told the commission the steps she has taken to stay sober.

**Amanda Tallent**

Ms. McNeal said that based on passage of time, Ms. Tallent will be eligible to receive her service permit on 6/5/2014. Ms. Tallent appeared by phone where she told the commission the steps she has taken to stay sober.

**Joshua E. Pearson**

Ms. McNeal said that based on passage of time, Mr. Pearson will be eligible to receive his service permit on 7/22/2015. Mr. Pearson was unavailable by phone.

**Jasper's**

Annabelle Henry presented at the administrative hearing and before the commission meeting. Licensee, Mike Chamberlin and his attorney appeared before the commission. Mr. Mills is not contesting the standard sanction but he is contesting the aggravation because the licensee had purchased AVE equipment prior to the violation. The licensee was unaware the purchasing of AVE would aggravate a violation. Mr. Mills encouraged the agency to look at a policy change?

Commissioner Harper clarified that the licensee did not understand the aggravation for not using the equipment.

#### **Agent Appointments**

##### **1104 Rockaway**

Jennifer Ruef appeared before the commission. Ms. Ruef has been acting as temporary agent at the Rockaway liquor store since June 2013 when her father, William Ruef, passed away. Based on the application process, experience in the agency and screening committee scores, OLCC staff considers Ms. Ruef to be qualified to be appointed as permanent agent. Commissioner Harper thanked Ms. Ruef for her service and extended any assistance needed.

##### **1030 Klamath Falls**

Mr. Flemming said that Ms. Fronckowiak was the only qualified applicant for this store appointment. Doris Fronckowiak appeared before the commission to present her qualifications and business plans for the Klamath Falls liquor store to the board. Ms. Fronckowiak said she plans to explore the idea of adding a growler station to the store.

##### **1070 Prairie City**

Blaine Huffman, of Huffman's Market, Inc., appeared before the Commission to present his qualifications and business plans for the Prairie City liquor store. If selected, Mr. Huffman would move the liquor inventory to his Market. Commissioner Révoal clarified the store layout with Mr. Huffman. Commissioner Harper asked if Mr. Huffman plans to keep his beer and wine inventory in the same location. Mr. Huffman said yes the inventory will stay the same.

Sam McDaniel, of Mountain View Mini Market Inc., appeared before the Commission to present his qualifications and business plans for the Prairie City liquor store. If selected, Mr. McDaniel would move the liquor inventory to his Mini Market. Chairman Patridge asked what the typical single sale at the Mini Market is. Mr. McDaniel said it is 10-15 dollars. Commissioner Révoal clarified the current layout and future layout with liquor.

##### **1097 North Bend**

Mr. Flemming said Laurie Dickey was the only qualified applicant for this store appointment. Ms. Dickey appeared before the Commission to present her qualifications and business plans for the North Bend liquor store.

##### **1210 Medford West**

Tom Jarmer, of MBC Investments, LLC., appeared before the Commission to present his qualifications and business plan. If selected, Mr. Jarmer plans to re-locate the liquor store two blocks away to a larger space in Jackson Creek Shopping Center which he owns. Commissioner Révoal asked when the proposed move could occur. Mr. Jarmer said it would probably take three months for the cities permitting process. Commissioner Harper asked about Mr. Jarmer's time commitment if selected as the new agent. Mr. Jarmer said he is in the

area a couple times per month but if selected, he would be in Medford a couple times per week. Mr. Jarmer has asked the current agent, Robert Zepf, to stay on and manage the store.

Rachelle Woodward appeared before the Commission to present her qualifications and business plans. Commissioner Révoal asked if she plans to change the store hours. She would like to extend the hours but would like observe and ask current staff what would be better served, to open earlier or stay open later in the evening. If selected, Ms. Woodward would like to eventually move the store to a nicer and larger location.

Bill Minihan appeared before the Commissioners and presented the improvements he has made to his current location. He mentioned that Eugene is becoming a location known for its craft brewing. To improve customer service, Mr. Minihan would like to add beer and wine and focus on products made in Eugene. Commissioner Révoal said he likes Mr. Minihan's store and is looking forward to having a made in Oregon section in the store while maintaining the current selection of liquor.

### **1218 Eugene Downtown**

Ken Hand appeared before the Commissioners and presented the plans he has to convert his store from exclusive to non-exclusive. Mr. Hand said he recently moved his store which has increased his business and with this change, he will be able to give an even more exclusive service to his customers. Commissioner Révoal said he really appreciates the new location and congratulated Mr. Hand.

### **1229 Eugene Westside**

Tim Woodhead appeared before the Commissioners and presented the plans he has to convert his store from exclusive to non-exclusive. Mr. Woodhead recently came to this business from the wine industry so he knows all the players and how wineries like to have their product in an exclusive store rather than a big grocery store. In addition to adding beer and wine, he plans to add a growler station too. Mr. Woodhead said this will be important to his business as the city is preparing to do major construction on the road his store is located. Commissioner Révoal said Mr. Woodhead is correct about the cities plans and he is glad that Mr. Woodhead is doing this before the construction begins so he can begin to build his customer base.

Commissioner Révoal moved to amend the retail sales agreements from exclusive to non-exclusive for the Eugene NE, Eugene Downtown and the Eugene Westside stores.

Chairman Patridge said while the board is looking at agent items, he would like staff to look into extending the hours/distance in the policy which requires an agent to be within a one hour distance from their home to their liquor store.

### **RULES**

Annabelle Henry, Administrative Policy and Process division presented.

### **Initial Action**

#### ***OAR 845-005-0400 Liquor Liability Insurance or Bond Requirement***

Under ORS 471.168, certain licensees must maintain liquor liability insurance or a bond that provides coverage for personal injuries caused by intoxicated persons served alcoholic beverages on the licensed premises while visibly intoxicated. Failure to comply with the liquor liability insurance or bond requirement constitutes a serious threat to public health and

safety, and allows the Commission to immediately suspend license privileges or refuse to renew the license in addition to sanctioning the licensee or refusing to license the applicant. OAR 845-005-0400 implements this statute. However, the current rule fails to adequately define proof of compliance during licensure or clearly distinguish between the Commission's authority to immediately suspend license privileges and its authority to sanction a licensee for past failure to comply. It also classifies all coverage gaps, regardless of their duration, as Category I violations.

The proposed amendments contemplate the following changes: (1) Restructure the rule; (2) Clarify "proof of compliance" requirements; (3) Clearly distinguish between the Commission's authority to immediately suspend license privileges and its authority to sanction licensees; (4) Establish a graduated sanction schedule; and (5) Address seasonal and temporary closures.

Commissioner Harper moved to initiate rulemaking to amend OAR 845-005-0400, and to hold a rulemaking hearing at staff's discretion.

### **Final Action**

#### ***OAR 845-005-0329, 845-005-0331, 845-006-0309 Outdoor Areas Rules Package***

Since March 2012, the Commission has granted an increasing number of annual liquor licenses in areas where food service is provided by food carts and alcohol is sold and consumed in delineated outdoor areas. Taking into consideration the unique nature of these types of premises, which consist solely of an outdoor area where alcohol is served and consumed, the Commission has placed certain operational restrictions on each of these licenses.

Proposed new rule OAR 845-005-0329 sets forth the licensing qualification standards that would apply to outdoor areas that do not abut a licensed building (i.e., food carts) and is designed to operate in conjunction with proposed new rule OAR 845-006-0309, which sets forth the operating requirements that would apply to these locations.

The proposed amendments to OAR 845-005-0331 clarify that the licensing qualification standards articulated in this rule only apply to outdoor areas that do abut a licensed building, which would effectively distinguish these areas from the exclusively outdoor areas addressed in proposed new rules OAR 845-005-0329 and OAR 845-006-0309.

Ms. Henry said she has a letter of endorsement from the City of Portland who was unable to make it to today's meeting to testify. She asked if the Chairman would like her to read it aloud or make copies and incorporate it into the record.

Chairman Patridge asked for copies and wanted to make it clear that this rule only applies to food carts. The Chairman does not want to be too prescriptive with our rulemaking in regard to issues such as hours of operation. Chairman accepted the letter from the City of Portland dated April 23, 2014 into the record. Commissioner Révoal clarified that the rule applies statewide but the city of Portland worked collaboratively with the agency in the rulemaking process.

***OAR 845-009-0130 Training Requirement for Off-Premises Sales Employees***

This rule describes training requirements for the employees of Off-Premises Sales licensees. Specifically, it requires an Off-Premises Sales licensee to ensure that each employee read, sign and date a Commission-provided training brochure, or a comparable licensee-provided training brochure, before allowing the employee to sell alcoholic beverages.

The proposed amendments restructure the rule to improve its clarity and expand training options to eliminate training redundancies for employees required to hold a service permit to dispense alcoholic beverages into securely covered containers provided by the consumer (i.e., growlers) and those employees who elect to obtain a service permit for other reasons.

Commissioner Harper moved to amend OAR 845-009-0130, effective June 1, 2014.

**ADMINISTRATION**

**Budget/Revenue Presentation**

Michael O'Connor, Financial Services Director presented the agencies current budget and a draft of the Policy Option Packages (POP) staff is preparing for the next biennium. Mr. O'Connor said as a result of the February session, the legislature has distributed the "salary pot" which has increased the agencies budget by 1.2 million dollars so we are back on track to where we should be. Mr. O'Connor reviewed the process for preparing the agency budget for next biennium and the POP's with the board.

**Policy & Communications**

Steve Marks, Executive Director; Rane Niedermeier, Communications Director; and Kelly Rount, Wholesale and Manufacturer Specialist presented.

Ms. Niedermeier told the board the plan is to involve legislators early in regard to the agency budget and POP's. We will take advantage of the upcoming legislative days on May 28-30<sup>th</sup> by meeting with our legislators. Prior to those legislative days, we will meet with Senator Lee Beyer, Representative Margaret Doherty and Senator Betsy Johnson who all hold key chairmanships and have been involved in retail innovation discussions. Staff is currently working on the budget narratives which the commission will be receiving one page summaries on as soon as possible.

Ms. Niedermeier gave an overview of the Bend community meeting which was held in March. Staff met with local community leaders to begin fostering working relationships and hear first hand the issues that are coming from particular communities. We learned the city and county sheriff felt they had a really good working relationship with the OLCC staff in Bend and licensees. Bend places a high priority on TSL events in their community. They are concerned about access to minors if liquor were to be expanded into grocery stores and they are concerned about the prospect of marijuana and want to be involved in putting together

the rules should an initiative pass. All of the attendees were very appreciative of the outreach. After the community leader meeting, we met with OLCC staff and had a good meeting discussing how to better communicate with our field offices. On the way back to Portland the group visited a few liquor stores and got to talk to agents and hear their concerns but mostly those were positive conversations. There is a similar meeting scheduled in Medford on April 30<sup>th</sup>. We have invited Josephine and Jackson County, Medford, Ashland, Central Point, Grants Pass and legislators which represent those areas.

Commissioner Harper asked staff to stay non-partisan in these meetings as they go to meetings around the state and not sway attendees one way or another in regard to privatization. He also asked if there are meetings held in their district that staff invites the Commissioner to the meeting. Chairman Patridge agreed Commissioners should be involved in meetings held in their district. Ms. Niedermeyer said the focus of the meetings have been on controlling our licensees and working with counties and cities to keep business running safely.

### *Wine Growler Issue*

Kelly Routt gave background information about the federal ruling on wine growlers. For several years qualified licensees have had the privilege to fill growlers, and 2013, a bill was passed which added wine and cider to the growler privilege. In March 2014, the TTB issued a federal ruling which required licensees who are dispensing wine into growlers to obtain a tax paid wine house bottling permit. Now retail licensees and some wineries will now have to get the permit in order to not violate federal law. In early April, Oregon's Federal Congressional Delegation reached out to the TTB asking them to reconsider this ruling. If the board chooses to act, staff is prepared to send a letter, in support of Oregon's wine industry, under the Commissions signature asking the TTB to reconsider the ruling as well.

Chairman Patridge is in support of sending the drafted letter to the TTB. Chairman Patridge motioned: In order to allow for continued innovation in the retail sale of wine for off premises consumption, I move to authorize the Chair to request that the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau reconsider the guidance contained in TTB Ruling 2014-3 in order to allow for sale of wine growlers by licensees who do not qualify as tax paid bottling houses.

Commissioner Révoal asked if this was a revenue move on the part of the TTB, Ms. Routt said she wasn't sure if it was a revenue move as much as a look at their permits and believe this fell under their permitting. Ms. Routt said there have not been any public safety issues with the filling of wine growlers.

### *Redemption Center Compliance*

Ms. Routt said the OLCC has the authority to enforce the bottle bill. There are currently seven redemption centers in Oregon. According to reports, consumers are increasingly opting to use redemption centers. Redemption center participation is not required if you are a retailer within a 3 mile radius however, you must provide equivalent services. We have recently been made aware, there are some retail outlets located in the Salem redemption center convenience zones which are not participating and are not providing equivalent services. Staff proposes to notify these stores in writing of the current state of the law and request that these stores

respond to us by May 30, 2014. If they are not in compliance with the requirements by June 30, 2014, the commission may issue a license suspension or civil penalty.

Commissioner Révoal asked why Salem, Ms. Routt said that is the area we received information about. Mr. Marks said if the board is in agreement, staff will be sending out letters this afternoon. The Commissioners agreed the letters should be sent.

#### ***Other Administrative Matters***

Steve Marks gave an update on the Fontaine Bleau issue: Fontaine Bleau has exhausted their administrative remedies related to the suspension of their liquor license. The Commission issued final orders by default on April 2 and March 19 for the immediate suspension and the underlying violations respectively. These orders were the result of the licensee failing to request a hearing.

The agency has received tort claim notices from the licensee as well as two of the shooting victims; however, we have not been served with an actual claim.

Mr. Marks told the Commissioners that he, Merle and John would be conducting the final interviews on Monday for the Licensing Director position. He said Joshua Williams has accepted the Administrative Policy & Process Director position. Mr. Williams is a District Attorney in Benton County; he holds a law degree and a master's degree in business administration. Mr. Williams will start on June 16, 2014.

Mr. Marks thanked Jesse Sweet who has done an outstanding job in the role of acting AP&P director. Chairman Patridge also thanked Jesse for the diligence and great work he has done.
