

Where Your Liquor Dollars Go


The Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC) contributed more than \$445 million to Oregon programs, cities and counties in the 2014-16 biennium. Of that, more than \$253 million went to the General Fund to help pay for programs such as schools, police and public health programs.

OLCC revenue is distributed to the General Fund and to other Oregon programs based on a plan created by the state Legislature. OLCC, liquor store agents, alcohol manufacturers and distributors all play a role in creating the revenue.

Mental health, alcohol and drug treatment services benefit from more than \$17 million, which helps to pay for addiction programs across the state. The Oregon Wine Board received \$600,000.

OLCC gave more than \$79 million to Oregon cities and \$39 million to counties. Local programs that benefit from OLCC revenues include enforcement, alcohol prevention and treatment as well as other public safety initiatives.

Cities also benefited from OLCC dollars through city revenue sharing, receiving approximately \$55 million.
