

DOUGLAS COUNTY CULTURAL RESOURCE INVENTORY, 1982

This is a descriptive analysis of the historic resources inventoried during a 1981-1982 survey of unincorporated private lands in Douglas County. The analysis examines first the resources of Exploration and Settlement and continues with Agriculture; Forestry and Milling; Transportation; Mining; Public and Social Organizations; and Commerce and Trade. Each theme is discussed in light of the resources' spatial distribution, temporal arrangement, architectural attributes, relative scarcity and significance to the County, State or Nation. An explanation of the project's methodology is entered in Appendix A.

The inventory was undertaken to fulfill comprehensive planning requirements. Statewide Planning Goal 5 states, "The location, quality and quantity of [historical] resources shall be inventoried." It also requires the conservation and protection of "inventoried" historical resources.

The inventory was also begun with the understanding that the identified resources provide us and future generations with a link to past ways of thinking, acting and believing. Conservation of these resources provides benefits to both the owners and the public. Measurable benefits include the improvement of housing and commercial structure stock, and economic diversification through increased tourism and investment. Equally important but less quantifiable benefits are the retention of a sense of place and continuity to communities and education and recreation opportunities.

This inventory will be evaluated by the Douglas County Historic Resources Review Committee. The Committee, established in 1981 to advise the County on matters concerning historic resources, will complete the evaluation process within about a year. They adopted criteria as a standard for determining the historical significance of each resource and the relative importance between resources. Resources that are determined "historically significant" will be protected by ordinance. Those of "historic interest" will be eligible for a sign or monument and those of "general interest" will only be listed as such.

EXPLORATION AND SETTLEMENT

Spatial Distribution and Siting

Sites and surviving structures of the exploration and settlement era (c. 1820-1860) in Douglas County are thinly scattered. The greatest quantity of these were found in a 15 mile swath between Yoncalla and Roseburg. The fertile Yoncalla and Calapooya Valleys and Lower North and South Umpqua Valleys are located within this area.

Exploration of the Umpqua Valley was begun in c. 1820 by trappers of the Northwest Company. The first recorded non-native structure in the Valley was that of John McKay, a Northwest Company guide and fur company clerk. The shelter he built, called McKay's Fort, stood on the Umpqua River bank either at the community of Umpqua, six miles west of Sutherlin, or at the mouth of Hubbard Creek approximately five miles further west. This surveyed site is identified with a bronze plaque (qv. McKay's Fort). The fort was situated at or near the intersection of the Umpqua River and Calapooya Creek. Both were major landmarks and traveling routes during exploration.

The next resource (temporally) is the Applegate Trail (to be discussed under "Transportation") of 1846 and 1847, which was mapped along the path of least resistance. The Applegate survey party entered southern Douglas County north of the city of Drain, trod northward near the alignment of Interstate 5, and exited through Stagecoach Pass near Glendale.

Examples of surviving historic resources of this period were constructed in the 1850's. These were the farms of Donation Land Claimants, most of whom traveled overland in the late 1840's to 1855. The Claimants settled the bottom lands and built houses, barns and outbuildings usually on well-drained river or creek benches or on small knolls with a southern orientation. The Baker House, c. 1853, in Old Town Oakland is an unusually fine example of an early residence (qv. Baker, Dr. Dorsey/House). It is located 200 yards north of the Calapooya Creek at a break between the bottom land and the base of a gentle sloping hill.

The Forrest Barn of the same period and seven miles downstream is similarly situated (qv. Forrest, Richard/Barn). A hewn log house (qv. Archambeau,

Francoise X./House) was constructed at the edge of a bench overlooking the South Umpqua at Melrose, formerly French Settlement.

Of those Claimants who built nearer streams or rivers, many had their first residences swept away during the first few years of habitation (e.g., Redfield, John/Farm) or by the flood of 1864 (e.g., Emmett, John/House). The second Redfield residence was built far above the floodplain at the base of a hill, but was burnt by the Indians the next year. The third house was then constructed on a small rise closer to the Cow Creek, above flood waters and away from the timbered hillside that provided cover to Indians during their attack. The Emmett House was rebuilt on a small knoll above the floodplain and just south of the community of Umpqua, formerly known as Umpqua Ferry and the site of McKay's Fort. The Ziba Dimmick House (qv.) is a replacement for the first dwelling that was destroyed by floodwaters the first year of the Dimmicks' residence.

Some of these houses and barns, however, were built farther from large streams and rivers. The Richard Smith Farm in Pleasant Valley, just south of Yoncalla, and the Robert Hinkle House of Dixonville were sited in valleys created by small creeks; hence, flooding was not a threat. Both house and barn on these claims are situated at a break between the flat and poorly drained lands and the dryer but steeper hillsides.

Other lands, outside the swath between Yoncalla and Roseburg, were also settled in the 1850's. Virtually nothing remains of these habitations except on the Redfield Farm (as mentioned above), possibly two barns in the Tenmile-Olalla area southwest of Roseburg (qv. McGuire, John/Barn and Hull, O./ Barn), and the John Fullerton Barn north of Canyonville.

Immigrant occupation of the lands "owned" by Indian tribes and bands in the Umpqua Valley led to minor conflicts, treaties, and then skirmishes. The intersection of Council Creek and Cow Creek west of Riddle was the site of the 1853 treaty between the United States Government and the Cow Creek Band of the Umpqua Indian Tribe. This surveyed site is approximately 15 miles south of the infamous massacre site (qv. Lookingglass Massacre Site) of 1855 and the site of the "Battle of Olalla" site (qv. Olalla Reunion Grounds) that followed not long afterward. It is also the same distance from the Mid Cow Creek Val-

ley where houses and barns were incinerated in the mid 1850's (e.g., Redfield, John/Farm).

Surviving resources of this period were not found in concentrations representative of new historic districts. In other words, I did not find any new districts.

Architectural Attributes

Some residences of this period exhibit elements of the Classical Revival style. The aforementioned Dr. Dorsey Baker House is probably the best maintained example of this style found through the survey, and the Richard Smith House is probably the largest. The Baker House's asymmetrical gable is the only major variant. The Smith House reflects the proportion and clean lines of the "Greek Temple", but has received considerable alterations. The Ziba Dimmick House (c. 1854) is probably the finest structure in the inventory that reflects the "Temple Lines". This two story rectangular house with moderately pitched gable roof has received a few alterations, but still retains its architectural integrity. It is the only structure of the period in this inventory embellished with dentils at the eaves. The Classic elements are distinguishable on many dwellings of later periods (e.g., Smith, Bernard Pitzer/Farm and Jones, Henry/ House), but none of these later examples possess as fine a balance of the elements as do structures of the 1850's.

Two hewn log houses of this period were identified through this survey (qv. Archambeau, Francoise X./House and Redfield, John/Farm). Both have received a covering, one of clapboard and the other of stucco. The original portion of these structures are one and a half story, and approximately 25 feet by 20 feet. Hewn logs can still be seen on the inside of the Redfield house, as can a puncheon log floor.

Barns of this period are both gabled and asymmetrically gabled with drive-through portals on the ends for the former and sides for the latter. Those with the oldest confirmed dates appear to be of the latter (qv. Forrest, Richard/Barn). This barn is the finest and probably the oldest surviving barn in Douglas County. It is in excellent condition. The original portion of the barn is supported by four bents that create a large covered expanse above a

threshing floor. Other barns of this period, like the John Fullerton Barn, are in poor condition, if not dilapidated like the Sigfridson barn.¹

Scarcity and Significance

The sites and structures of this period are relatively scarce when compared to resources of later periods. Their significance is a function of scarcity; the people and events associated with them; and the architectural attributes incorporated within their frame. Of the exemplified sites, McKays Fort, the Applegate Trail and the Cow Creek Treaty Site of 1853 possess significance for the Nation, State and County. The other aforementioned sites are of significance to the County.

In general, the structures surveyed possess architectural significance for the State and are otherwise significant to the County. There are some exceptions, however. The Redfield house and farm was the home of Ed Redfield, the inventor of the Redfield gunsight used on U.S. military rifles during World War I. The Baker house was owned by the frontier entrepreneur who, between the early 1850's and 1880 owned a store and the first flourmill in Douglas County and amassed a fortune by banking, railroad building and steamship operation in Washington and on the Columbia River. Both examples exhibit architectural attributes worthy of significance to State and County.

As a whole the early structures and sites of the County, like resources in other areas of Oregon, are significant to the State in that they were occupied by Settlers who secured the Oregon Territory for the Nation. This grasp of the land secured the territory against "foreign powers" far better than a military presence on land or ocean.

AGRICULTURE

The County's agricultural products have included cattle, hogs, grain, turkeys, prunes and other orchard crops, hops and milk. Surviving historic resources reflect general farming practices and cattle raising best.

Barns and associated residences are the most evident of all resources surveyed. Few hog houses or large smokehouses still stand. Turkeys were raised in the open with few specialized structures constructed for their production. Finally, the last known hop house in the County was dismantled in 1981.

The basic "farm", for this survey, was comprised of at least one surviving house and barn or other major agricultural building (e.g., Callahan, Geo. J./Farm). A multi-unit farm was made up of the basic house and barn, plus at least one other historic resource such as a second barn, granary shed, hog house, smokehouse, milk house or irrigation ditch (e.g., Jones, Jacob/Farm). The basic farm was by far more numerous than multi-unit farms. Large multi-unit farms with more than four surviving historic resources were approximately ten in number.

An agricultural building or house that was an integral part of a farm but is now the only surviving structure for that farm is treated as an isolated agricultural building, for the former, or residence, for the latter.

Spatial Distribution of Farms

Historic resources associated with agricultural pursuits are distributed throughout most valleys in the County. The few early surviving resources such as barns and houses are located in the broad valleys that were taken by Donation Land Claimants in the late 1840's and the first half of the 1850's. Some early farm buildings have survived with buildings from a later period, but none have survived in the company of another from the same period. The Richard Forrest Barn, c. 1853, is the closest example of this association. The barn is in excellent condition, but the surviving house of a year later was converted into a machine shed.

Agricultural buildings from later periods are distributed fairly regularly throughout the County's central valleys. These are the replacement and additional houses, barns and granaries of the early farmers made necessary as farms grew larger and more prosperous (e.g., John Long Farm of Yoncalla). They are also the new farms created by those who arrived in the County during the latter part of the 19th and early 20th centuries (e.g., Geo. Callahan Farm) and by the matured descendants of the first settlers (e.g., Ed LaBrie Farm). Also included in this group are the homesteads located in heavily for-

ested areas of the Umpqua River's headwaters (e.g., Joseph Hutchinson Farm). Concentrations of these resources occur in nine areas that are the most fertile areas in the County and that were settled first in the early 1850's. The greatest concentrations of surveyed farms; on which cattle and grain were produced, are in: the Dixonville area east of Roseburg; Cow Creek Valley between Azalea and Glendale; Days Creek area; Umpqua to Sutherlin area; Brockway area northwest of Winston; Pleasant Valley near Yoncalla. Garden Valley, west of Roseburg, and Glenbrook Loop Road, west of Riddle, are areas with a concentration of surviving farms and farm buildings associated with prunes and the production of other orchard crops.

Except for two variables, the arrangement of buildings was different for each farm. In most cases the barn is over 50 yards but less than 200 yards from the house. (An exception to this interval is the large Nathaniel Curry Farm, c. 1900, where the cattle barn is located approximately one-half mile from the house.) The other variable was peculiar to multi-unit farms. These farms were usually arranged in a linear pattern along a public or private road. The Jacob Jones Farm, with 15 buildings, is a good example of this pattern. The house and the main barn are separated by 200 yards, with a granary and associated farm buildings placed in between and along the road. The density of buildings becomes greater nearer the house.

The arrangement of farm buildings around the perimeter of a rectangular farm yard was apparent for only a few of the large multi-unit farms (e.g., Joseph L. Clough Farm). The distance between the house and barn in this pattern was the same interval as for other farms.

Farmhouses: Architectural Attributes and Relative Scarcity

Historic resources found most often on farms in Douglas County were houses and barns. Irrigation ditches, fruit driers and granaries were also found. The most common style of house was no style at all. It was rather what the local carpenter or owner/builder believed a house should look and be arranged like. This vernacular expression incorporates some of the elements of the Classic Revival style (partial eave returns, boxed eaves and a wide frieze board), Gothic Revival Style (steep-pitched gabled roof, wall dormers, tall narrow windows), and the Queen Anne style (turned and shaped wooden embellishments and imbricated shingle work). The farmhouse is usually a gabled,

one and a half story rectangular structure. It often has a rear ell or is T-shaped. They are, except for a few, bold, plain farmhouses. If they are architecturally significant, it is to the County as an example of common farm dwellings. The uncommon are also evident, such as the elegant George Quine House. It is the only brick residence in unincorporated Douglas County.

The second most frequent house style found is that of the Transitional Box. Most of these examples are also relatively unassuming and plain. There are, however, approximately a score that exhibit fine craftsmanship, lines and embellishments (e.g., Walter Britt House, Ely and Emma Wilson House, and N. Lauts House, respectively).

The surveyed examples of the Bungalow and the Queen Anne are the next less frequently surveyed farm houses. The Bungalow in total number is common in rural Douglas County, but it appears less common on this inventory because it had to be associated with a notable (e.g., George Marsh House), of exceptional quality, or exhibit a tie with another important historic resource (e.g., Dr. Geo. Bradborn House). The houses fashioned in the Queen Anne style, on the other hand, are few in number relative to all houses of 50 years or more. The finest is the Nathaniel Curry House (qv. Curry, Nathaniel/Farm). The few farmhouses fashioned in this style are relatively plain (e.g., Weaver, Adam/Farm No. 1). The only farmhouse built as a duplex was crafted in the Queen Anne style (qv. Springer, Rudolph/Farm).

The Cottage style as associated with agricultural pursuits is represented in this survey by two fine examples: the Cyrus Smith House and the Ward Cockram House. They are included here because of their association with other historic resources and a notable, respectively. This style exists in other farmhouses in rural Douglas County, but the houses are not of a refined design or workmanship, or they are not associated with notables or other historic resources.

Only two farmhouses crafted in the Gothic Revival style have survived. These houses (qv. James Dunnavin Farm and Simon Segil House) possess elements of the style but are more at the vernacular expression of that style. They are of similar appearance and size and are located within five miles of each other. It is possible they were constructed by the same carpenter in the 1870's-1880's.

Three hewn and approximately 10 peeled log houses and cabins were surveyed. Two of the hewn log houses were built on farms in the early 1850's (qv. Archambeau, Francis/House, and Redfield, John/Farm), and the third was built in the mid-1870's (qv. Callahan, Geo.). All three have received alterations and additions. The peeled log houses and cabins were built on homesteads between 1900 and 1930 (e.g., Hill, Frank/Homestead). These too have received some alterations and additions. As a whole, the houses and cabins are good examples of hewn and peeled log construction techniques.

The last group of farmhouses to be reviewed were crafted in the Classical Revival style, as discussed in the "Exploration and Settlement" section. There are relatively few surviving structures of this style. Some farmhouses built after 1859 appear to have been constructed after the style, but are missing important elements. The Bernard Pitzer Smith House is an example. It possesses the symmetry, balance, roof and proper line treatment of the main entrance, but it was fitted with four over four double-hung windows instead of six over six. The two-story farmhouse on the George Neuner Ranch (qv.) is another example. This structure, with its full two-story veranda, moderately sloped roof, proportion, and internal chimney, appears to have been constructed in the style, but was fitted with four over four double-hung windows.

The majority of the surviving farmhouses in Douglas County appear to have been the product of builder/owners or a local carpenter who constructed the dwelling in the manner and image that he believed correct. Only a small percentage of the surviving farmhouses were crafted close to an architectural style.

Barns: Architectural Attributes and Relative Scarcity

Among many variations, the surviving barns in this survey appear to have been raised in five basic themes and by four methods.

The first is the "English Barn" with drive-through portals centered on the sides. The sides are usually twice the length of the gable ends. The later barns of this style (e.g., Weaver, Peter/Barn) are gabled and often have a hay mow over either side and above the drive. Hay is internally loaded. The earlier examples of this style (e.g., Forrest, Richard/Barn) do not have a mow and the hay is stored on either side of the drive.

The second configuration is either square or rectangular and gabled. Drive-through portals are centered on the ends, often with animal stalls along the side aisles. A hay mow is usually absent on early examples (e.g., Long, John/Barn) and present on examples from the 1880's and later (e.g., Jones, Jacob/Barn No. 2). Hay is internally loaded in the former and externally loaded in the latter.

The "Western" or "Oregon" barn (e.g., Ellison, John/Barn) is either square or rectangular with a steep pitched gable roof on the front elevation and a gable on hip roof at the rear elevation. A hay hood is persistent. Animal stalls are located on the side aisles. A drive-through located on the sides near the rear is often used as a covered feeding area. The central floor space is occupied by a granary, tack room and storage. Hay is externally loaded to the hay mow.

Log barns are the fourth type of barn surveyed. Only three in good condition survive in the County. These were raised on homesteads between 1900 and 1918 (e.g., Case, Frank/Barn). Stacked peeled logs create a cube which is covered with a steep gable roof. The cube supports the upper ends of the rafters of flanking lean-tos. The lean-tos provide minimum protection for cattle and mangers. Hay is externally loaded into the cube through a four by four foot "window" on one elevation and loaded to the mangers on the wall through a section of missing log above the mangers. (This method was also used at least once in the County when lumber was scarce during World War II.)

The Samuel Evans Jr. Barn was the only surveyed octagonal barn. It is one of seven octagonal barns in Oregon² and one of two in the County. It has a drive-through. Hay is loaded to the mow internally. Nailed posts and beams support the structure. These are infilled with sawn two by four inch framing.

There are three basic methods of joinery used in the first three types of barns. The earliest method, mortise and tenon joinery, was commonly employed until the late 1880's but was evidenced in some as late as 1900 and in the Ben Jones Barn in 1920. Most of the barns surveyed were constructed in this method. Posts and beams were either hewn with a broad ax or sawn to an eight by

eight inch dimension. Main frame members of a few barns were hewn to an eight by ten or ten by ten inch dimension. The mark of the adz was not seen on any hewn members.

Pole construction techniques were evident in barns beginning c. 1880. These were nailed or joined with mortise and tenons. Often both methods were employed in the same barn (e.g., Hall, Langley/Barn). Early pole barns appear to be finely crafted, but the quality of craftsmanship diminishes with later barns.

Barns with balloon framing of sawn dimensional lumber were also surveyed (e.g., Peterson, Peter/Barn). Barns of this technique are common in Douglas County, but few are entered in this inventory. Their inclusion here is caused by an association with a notable or because they are a part of a group of historic resources.

Other Agricultural Buildings and Objects: Architectural Attributes and Relative Scarcity

Granaries

The freestanding granary was an integral part of large grain and cattle operations in Douglas County. A few of these still stand, but they are now used for woodsheds, work sheds or stand vacant. There are four notable free-standing granaries built between c. 1880 and 1990. They are all loaded within the wagon drive. The Dixon Granary (qv.) is unloaded through the sides under flanking lean-tos. It is the only granary constructed with sawn posts and beams and infilled with studs. The other granaries (e.g., Jones, Jacob/Granary) are unloaded in the drive-through. They are of sawn two by four construction.

Prune Driers

Cured prunes and other orchard crops contributed substantially to the County's economy between c. 1800 and c. 1930. Fruit was dried in "evaporators". It was more usual than not for an orchardist, even a small orchardist, to own and operate his own evaporator on his farm. Many of them were destroyed by fire during operation. Others were converted into work sheds or left to decay. Now prune driers in fair condition are relatively scarce.

The John Sutton Prune Drier (qv.) is one of the few examples of an intermediate sized evaporator. It is in poor condition. The Norbert Riddle evaporator is a relatively large evaporator. They are gabled and constructed of nailed sawn post and beams or balloon construction. At ground level, furnaces of both types forced hot air upwards through drying racks located on the second floor. Little room was provided for packing the product in smaller evaporators. The larger type, on the other hand, had a packing room integrated in the structure (e.g. Helweg, Paul/Fruit Drier).

Irrigation Ditches

Over thirty irrigation ditches were dug in the Cow Creek Valley between the community of Azalea and the city of Glendale after 1861 and before 1909 (qv. Hydrologic Systems of Southern Douglas County). The ditches were dug by hand, usually, to a depth of one and a half feet and approximately five feet at the top and three feet at the bottom. Smaller ditches were also dug. The ditches diverted water from the creek as far as two miles, but many of them were of a shorter length. This reach of the Cow Creek Valley is the only area with a concentration of historic irrigation ditches.

Significance

Whatever style, period of construction or use, the surviving farm buildings and objects of the inventory underline the County's economic dependency on agricultural products. These historic resources were necessary for the production of food and fiber at the outset of settlement and for cash income as the demand for foodstuffs grew in the southern Oregon and California gold fields. Douglas County farms, the closest farming region to the mines, supplied this accelerating need and grew richer. The increased presence and diversity of historic buildings and objects (c. 1880's - c. 1920's) registered the increased importance of the County's agricultural products to larger northerly and southerly cities and to foreign countries. The increases also register the importance of these cash imports to the County.

On the whole, the surveyed agricultural buildings and objects are significant to the County as examples of the style, construction technique or building materials. Some, like the Sam Evans Jr. Barn (an octagonal barn) or the

Richard Forrest Barn (c. 1853) possess statewide significance for both style and scarcity.

The irrigation ditches of the mid-Cow Creek Valley possess significance for both the County and State as examples of antiquated methods of irrigating grains and pastures. These hydrologic systems extended the growing season of this small valley, giving farmers a comparative advantage over other areas. The State-ordered adjudication of these systems in 1930 gave their owners legal rights to the waters of Cow Creek.

Farm buildings associated with notables of the County are also evident in this survey. George Kohlhagen, Samuel Miller and Alonzo F. Brown raised cattle and other agricultural products on their vast ranch acreages. These men shipped carloads annually to large northern and southern cities, bringing prosperity to the County in return.

FORESTRY AND SAWMILLING

Spatial Distribution and Relative Scarcity

Early mills in the County were sited on the banks of streams and rivers to divert water for motive power. None have survived. The mill buildings and dams, as at Millwood on Hubbard Creek (qv. Clarke, William/House) did not survive the steam, diesel and electric-powered sawmills. Generally, mill equipment was sold for scrap, the buildings were dismantled or left to decay, and the dams were flooded, breached and destroyed.

The few buildings and structures constructed for forestry uses on private lands were replaced with steel structures (e.g., lookout towers) in the 1950's and 1960's, or were dismantled or left to decay. These buildings and structures were isolated in the forests of the County and located at strategic vantage points on mountain tops. The Middle Creek Warden Station (qv.) was an isolated lookout below the mountain summit. It is the only surviving structure in the County directly associated with forestry. It served as the summer residence of a Douglas Forest Protective Association fire warden and a base camp for fire fighters when a forest fire broke out in the area. The Station is located in the Middle Creek basin between Glendale and Riddle.

All splash dams have been manually or naturally breached. These dams, like the County Line Dam Site (qv.) in Camas Valley were built on streams in forested valleys to increase stream flow for the purpose of floating logs out of the forest. The streams did not have sufficient natural flow to buoy logs downstream without the periodic release of water from the dam.

The five surviving wigwam burners probably best symbolize the County's milling economy. Two are located between the cities of Drain and Yoncalla, and another is east of Roseburg. In the South County area, a burner stands isolated east of Tiller, and another within an active mill just north of the City of Glendale. They are no longer used as incinerators.

All other historic resources related to forestry and milling have been dismantled, destroyed, or left to decay.

Architectural Attributes and Significance

Historic mills in the County exist only as sites and therefore contribute nothing architecturally to the County's pool of surviving historic resources.

There were a few notable mills such as the Clarke Sawmill that possessed interesting engineering attributes (qv. Clarke, Wm./House). Water was diverted in a ditch from Hubbard Creek above the mill site. A ridge and sharp bend in the creek necessitated tunneling through approximately 200 yards of solid rock. The water was then flumed to the mill's water wheel below the lower tunnel portal. The tunnel portals are now caved in. This site is significant to the County for its direct association with the notable William B. Clarke, the fact that it was one of the first large sawmills to use a circular saw, in the area, and that it produced much of the lumber and timbers for houses, barns and other structures in central Douglas County.

Log splash dams also exist as sites only. The County Line Dam was one of the last to be used on the Middle Fork of the Coquille River. An iron rod embedded in the solid rock bank is the only visible evidence of the dam.

The dams were an integral link in transportation of logs from the hillsides to the mills. They provided an economic method of log transport which opened remote parts of the County to timber harvesting.

The Middle Creek Warden Station is the only surviving structure on private land constructed for forestry uses. It is a square, one story cabin with a hip roof. It was constructed c. 1925 of stacked logs that are square notched. It is chinked with mortar. The material and "style" of this cabin are typical of structures built in remote areas without roads. The direct association of the cabin with forestry uses, however, is rare in Douglas County. It is also the surviving example in the County of a pre-1930 building that was used for fire fighting by a regionally organized association. Organization like this did not occur in the Pacific Northwest Region until 1904 and 1911 in Douglas County.

Once a common sight in Douglas County, wigwam burners now are only five in number. Each mill, small or large, had one and sometimes two to incinerate wood waste until the mid 1960's. It was during this period that Douglas County's milling industry grew phenomenally and dominated the local economic base.

The wigwam burners contribute no special architectural attribute to the County's historic resource inventory other than their unique shape. They were commonly wrought in sheet steel and steel mesh and secured to a concrete perimeter foundation.

TRANSPORTATION

Portions of the historic transportation network through Douglas County are typical of one of four kinds of resources. Routes, the earliest resources, are inventoried here as sites. Structures that are a part of the routes, such as bridges, are a second type of resource, and inns and other commercial structures are a third. The last type inventoried is that of a surviving historic vehicle that is now permanently affixed.

Spatial Distribution

The identified routes in the County are the Applegate Trail, the Roberts Mountain Road and the Coos Bay Wagon Road. The present day freeway, highway and road follow historic routes closely. The Applegate Trail was surveyed in 1846-1847 from the northern border of the County near Drain through the cities of Oakland, Roseburg, Myrtle Creek, and Canyonville. It exited through Stagecoach Pass near Glendale. This route followed the small and large valleys of the Umpqua.

The Coos Bay Wagon Road was surveyed in 1870 from Roseburg to Coos Bay. Except for a few variants, the present day road follows the old alignment. It crosses plains in Lookingglass Valley just west of Roseburg, and the rugged Coastal Mountains west of Reston.

Roberts Mountain Road is a portion of the route built by Colonel Joe Hooker in c. 1858 from Scottsburg to Myrtle Creek. The narrow present day road winds along the steep sides of Roberts Mountain following the alignment of this historic route.

Other routes in the County have not been included because they cannot be traced with a reasonable degree of accuracy, or because they do not possess historic significance.

Structures that are directly associated with transportation routes include bridges, tunnels, a ferry and a railway station. Seven O&C railroad bridges were surveyed. These span the South Umpqua and small tributaries of the Umpqua and North Umpqua Rivers along the line between Glendale and Drain. Tunnels were also a part of the O&C Railroad. They are located within the lower Cow Creek Canyon between Glendale and Riddle.

The O&C Railroad depot (qv.) is located beside the mainline track in the community of Dillard, approximately eight miles southwest of Roseburg. It will be moved to the Douglas County Museum in the summer of 1983 for permanent display.

Two road bridges were identified in the Myrtle Creek area. An arched concrete spans the South Umpqua River, and the Neal Lane covered bridge spans South Myrtle Creek. Other historic road bridges have been replaced or are of common construction.

The Douglas County Poor Farm Ferry (qv.) was the only ferry inventoried separately. It is located on the main stem of the Umpqua approximately five miles northwest of Roseburg. Other notable ferries, such as the Dimmick Ferry and the Umpqua Ferry, crossed the Umpqua River further downstream and are mentioned with surviving historic resources (qv. Dimmick, Ziba/House and Kemp, William/Farm). Still other ferries were not included in this inventory because the sites could not be located with reasonable accuracy, or because they do not possess historic significance.

The third type of transportation-related historic resources is the commercial establishments and signs along historic transportation routes. These are service stations, inns and highway signs. Generally, they are located along Old Highway 99 that runs the length of the County. These resources will be discussed in greater detail in the "Commerce/Trade" section.

The last transportation-related historic resource is that of a vehicle which is now permanently affixed. The pilot house of the sternwheeler Eva was removed when the vessel was retired. It is now located on a tidal cattle ranch one mile northeast of Reedsport. The Eva transported people and goods on the Umpqua River between Winchester Bay and Gardiner and the head of tide at Scottsburg for 22 years beginning in 1894.

Architectural Attributes and Relative Scarcity

The original roadbeds of the inventoried historic transportation routes have long been covered or torn up. The routes are now identifiable by the present-day roadbeds. They satisfied basic transportation needs from the mid-1800's to 1910's. Originally their numbers were few, and now only these three are identifiable.

The structures directly associated with the transportation routes are still in good condition and are still serviceable. The inventoried O&C Railroad bridges are wrought in rolled steel fastened with rivets and bolts. As replacements of the original wooden bridges constructed in the mid-1870's and the mid-1880's, they are seven of many on the O&C Railroad line. All seven were designed by the American Bridge Company of New York and erected by the O&C Railroad Company in 1906.

Originally eight tunnels were bored through rock outcroppings above Cow Creek between Glendale and Riddle in 1883 for the railroad bed. A portion of the track was permanently moved across the Creek, necessitating a new tunnel, when a landslide destroyed the track upstream from the west fork of Cow Creek. All except one tunnel is still used for rail traffic. The tunnels are either hard rock or shored with timbers. The former are faced with concrete portals, whereas timbers project from the latter. Timbers are screened and gunnited.

The Dillard Railroad Depot was built before 1910 and after the line was extended southward from Roseburg To California. It is a one story, rectangular structure. The moderately pitched gable roof is supported at the eaves with decorative purlins and with scroll at the gable ends. This is the only surviving and intact O&C Railroad depot in Oregon (a portion of another depot is located in Canby, Oregon).³

A road and highway bridge identified in this inventory are constructed in different methods and are relatively scarce in the County and the State. The South Umpqua Bridge (qv.) at Myrtle Creek was constructed of reinforced con-

crete with three arches in 1922. It is one of five similarly designed bridges built in southwestern Oregon, and one of about twenty in the state.⁴

The Neal Lane Bridge (qv.) is the only other road bridge of merit in this inventory. It is the shortest of five covered bridges in the County. (The other covered bridges were identified in previous surveys.) The Neal Lane Bridge, an "A" frame, was constructed in 1939 of timbers and covered with a wooden frame house.

The west cable support post of the Douglas County Poor Farm Ferry is the only remaining in situ artifact of the County's ferries. The post is ten feet high. It measures ten by ten inches at the base and eight by eight inches at the top. A square sided notch was cut in the top to receive the cable. The other ferries exist as sites.

Of the many sternwheelers that shipped people and goods between Scottsburg, Winchester Bay and Gardiner, the pilot house of the Eva (qv. Eva Pilot House) is the only large artifact intact. The eight by twelve foot house is constructed of cedar with a variety of joining techniques. Double pane lights occupy the upper half of the wall on all sides. These lights drop down within the wall. The overhanging flat top roof was added after the ship was dismantled. A hinged door provides access on both sides.

Historic Significance

The aforementioned sites, structures and objects associated with the transportation network in and through Douglas County are significant to the County. Some are significant to the state and a few are significant to the nation.

The Applegate Trail (qv.) is significant to the nation, state and County because it was the earliest surveyed route commissioned by the Federal government from the southwestern states to the Pacific Northwest region. The route was one of the few that early settlers used to gain access to the County and the Willamette Valley. Portions of the route are still used as the major highway access in and through the County.

The Roberts Mountain Road (qv.), a portion of "Hooker Road", the road surveyed by and built under the supervision of Colonel Joe Hooker in c. 1858, is significant in the County's history. This route connected the head of tide at Scottsburg with Roseburg and the California gold fields. It was used for packing and freight during the settlement period and was the stage route until 1882, when the O&C Railroad began service south of Roseburg. The route over Roberts Mountain is, with minor variations, the same as the original.

The Coos Bay Wagon Road (qv.) is significant to the nation, state and County. It was established by an Act of Congress in 1869. The State Legislature designated the Coos Bay Wagon Road Company as the beneficiary of the Congressional Grant. The County played a part in the Road when it was deeded all rights and interests to a portion of the Road when it appropriated money for road repair. These three identified routes satisfied some of the basic transportation needs of the County, state and nation.

The two highway bridges identified in this inventory are significant to the State and County because they exemplify engineering techniques and building methods found in relatively few other bridges in the State and the County. The ferry is important to the County as the only identifiable one of its kind in the County.

The O&C Railroad bridges and tunnels are significant to the state and County as examples of early engineering feats. They are also a portion of the transportation network that made possible bulk shipping of agricultural products and other goods to large southern and northern markets. The O&C Railroad depot is significant to the nation, state and County as the remaining intact example of an O&C depot in Oregon.

The pilot house of the Eva is important to the County as the only remaining structural artifact of a sternwheeler that provided transportation on the Umpqua River tidewater.

PUBLIC AND SOCIAL ORGANIZATIONS

Historic resources relating to this theme are sites and structures where governmental and private organizations provided services or sustenance to citizens or members of the organization. Sites and structures used by govern-

mental organizations are represented by a courthouse site, a poor farm, post offices and schools. Structures that were used by fraternal or religious organizations include granges and churches.

Spatial Distribution and Relative Scarcity

The Umpqua County Court was held at many locations including Elkton, Scottsburg,⁵ and near Interstate 5 Exit 142 north of Oakland.⁶ The latter site is on the David Underwood Donation Land Claim. Court was held on the second floor of the Underwood house, which no longer stands. Umpqua County was consolidated with Douglas County in 1862. This, the only courthouse site that can be identified for Umpqua County, is in the unincorporated area.

The Douglas County Poor Farm was one of a few farms where the County lodged its paupers, and the only one owned by the County. Prior to the farm's purchase, the County contracted with farmers to care for its wards. The farm occupies the west bank of the Umpqua River in the Melrose area approximately five miles northwest of Roseburg. The spatial distribution of buildings on this farm is similar to the linear pattern described in the "AGRICULTURAL" section.

Post offices were generally scattered throughout the rural areas. Virtually all of the inventoried offices occupied spaces in enclosed porches or front halls of houses sited in small communities (Perdue, Lynn/House), or at the intersections of roads (Johnson, Arthur W./Farm), or roads and streams (Booth, Winifred/House; or Winston, Harry/House). A few of the offices were also located in other buildings, such as the Azalea General Store (qv.) and a building made for a post office at Round Prairie (qv. Molzerth, M. A./House).

The geographic location of inventoried schools is similar to that of post offices. The greatest number were identified in the central valley between Yoncalla and Myrtle Creek. Some, like the Tison School of Drew and the Ash Valley School, are relatively isolated. The buildings were usually sited on

small benches or knolls above the flooding streams and rivers (e.g., Cedar Grove School and Brockway School).

The earliest grange hall identified was built in 1912 (qv. South Deer Creek Grange). Twelve granges currently meet in halls located in unincorporated areas of Douglas County. The halls are situated on roads that were main routes at the time of construction and in or near communities that were agriculturally oriented (e.g., Melrose Grange, Azalea Grange).

Four churches and a church camp were identified as historic resources in the rural areas of the County. The Umpqua Church is situated in a small grove of trees one mile south of the community of Umpqua (Umpqua Ferry). Pine Grove Church is located in Dixonville three miles east of Roseburg, and the Days Creek Methodist Church is perched at the edge of a bench at Days Creek. The Tenmile Methodist Church is also situated on a bench in Tenmile, approximately seven miles west of the City of Winston. The Fir Grove Bible Camp (c. 1910 - c. 1935) is spread out on a large bench overlooking the Windy Creek valley north of Glendale. Other churches and related buildings have been destroyed or are not apparent.

Architectural Attributes

The architectural attributes of structures and objects on the Douglas County Poor Farm are described in detail on inventory sheets for the house, schoolhouse, barn, granary and ferry. The style and method of construction and materials of each of these resources are not particularly different from those of houses and agricultural buildings described in the "AGRICULTURAL" section. The granary, as previously noted, is of unique construction for the County. It is the only granary supported by hewn posts and beams which are joined with mortise and tenons. It is in good condition.

The appearance of rural post offices did not develop into a standard form because virtually all were located in a portion of the postmaster's house. These were usually farmhouses which were discussed in the "AGRICULTURAL" section. Only the Molzerth Bunkhouse (qv.) was built for an office. It is a one story, rectangular structure with a gable roof that is utilitarian in appearance.

Surveyed schools provide a spectrum of rural structures that were the pride of the community and in which basic education was taught to pupils between the first and eighth grades. This spectrum is, however, divisible into three general groups which correlate with the period in which the school was constructed. The earliest surviving structures were built between the 1880's and 1910 (e.g., Days Creek School, Boomer Hill School, Roberts Creek School #1). These are rectangular structures of one story with a single room. The gabled roofs are usually of a moderate to steep pitch; some have a cupola. The eaves are always boxed and a frieze board is persistent. They are of balloon construction. Single and double entrances are common and always located at one gable end. The entrance is sheltered with a lean-to, gabled or hipped porch cover. Windows are either one over one or four over four double hung sash, often unevenly spaced on a side or a side and a gable end. These, like the farmhouses of Douglas County, are vernacular expressions of what a local builder believed a school should look like.

The schools of the c. 1910's to c. 1920's were square or rectangular and of one or two rooms (e.g., Roberts Creek School #2, Cedar Grove School). These had a hip roof and exposed eaves. A cupola was present on some. The walls were of balloon construction and sided with shiplap. Windows were one over one and emplaced on opposite sides. The main entrance was centered on an end.

The last period of schools to be discussed is from c. 1920's to c. 1935 (e.g., Wilbur School, Melrose). These schools are rectangular and of one story with a hipped roof. Eaves are either boxed or exposed. If boxed, they are narrow. Walls are of balloon construction and sided with shiplap. One over one, six over one and eight over one double-hung sashes set in evenly-spaced bays on the sides are commonly found window treatments. The main entrance is centered on the side and consists of double doors with sidelights and transom. The door is set in a recessed portico.

The Tison School (qv.) is of special note and is the only one of its kind in the County. The rectangular, gabled house was built in 1906 of hewn logs with dovetail notching. The windows are one over one double hung sash set uniformly on the sides. The main entrance is centered at the gable end and sheltered with a lean-to porch cover.

Grange and community halls identified through the survey are of a spartan appearance and construction. They are long, narrow structures with a gable roof. Some have a hipped gable. The eaves are always exposed. Walls are of stud construction, usually surfaced with rough horizontal board siding with the appearance of wide clapboard. The main entrance is located at the gable end and sheltered with a lean-to porch cover. Windows are commonly small four-pane lights evenly spaced and set high along the side walls. The quality of craftsmanship of the halls is fair to poor in comparison to other public and semi-public buildings surveyed.

The four churches identified through this survey are of a vernacular expression. They are all rectangular and of one story with a moderately steep-pitched gable roof. The eaves are always boxed and a frieze board is persistent. Only the Days Creek church was originally fitted with a bell tower. The original fenestration is regular with six over six or four over four double-hung lights. The Coles Valley Church is the only one of the four fitted with lancet windows. All of the churches have received alterations and additions to the original structures.

Significance

The structures and sites of public and social organizations in this inventory possess significance for the County and/or the state. The Umpqua County Courthouse site is important to both the County and the state as one of the seats of that short-lived County and the homesite of State Legislator David Underwood. It is the only such site in an unincorporated area that could be verified through the survey.

The Douglas County Poor Farm is an array of agricultural buildings that illustrate the structures associated with the County's pre-1900 methods of providing sustenance for its paupers. Together the buildings on this site are significant to the County. The granary is architecturally significant to the County.

The surveyed rural post offices situated in houses and other buildings are collectively significant to the County but are only of added interest to the overall significance of an individual structure. Collectively, the offices illustrate one aspect of the historic postal service of rural Douglas County.

Schools in this inventory possess collective significance as the "formal" educational institution of the County. Many provided this service for grades one through eight until the mid 1950's. These schools were one of the places where rural children learned to assimilate into a larger society. Most were social gathering places for rural communities (e.g., Days Creek School). Individually, some of the schoolhouses possess architectural significance (e.g., Tison School).

The rural granges of the County have played an important part in satisfying economic and social needs of its members and others of the County. Although grange halls are not architecturally significant, they are a symbol of the grange's presence in the County. The South Deer Creek Grange (qv.) is one of the more notable. The Grange's first Master, Dr. Clarence H. Bailey, served as editor of the Oregon Grange Bulletin from 1922 to 1940 and was a member of the Oregon State Grange Executive Committee from 1922 to 1932. The South Deer Creek Grange possesses significance for the State and the collective of the halls is significant for the County.

The four identified churches possess architectural significance for the County only. They were not constructed close to any one style or, if they were, have been altered so that they no longer resemble the style. They are also significant to the County because they were social gathering places and the purveyors of moral education, and because of their relative scarcity.

MINING

The inventoried resources in this theme include examples of gold, silver, nickel, copper and mercury mining activities. Clay pit sites and an early oil well site are also featured. These resources represent mining activities with above-ground evidence such as retorts, sheds and ditches. Some, such as the clay pits, are only sites. Mines, where an adit is the only above-ground evidence, have been omitted.

Spatial Distribution and Relative Scarcity

Gold mines and placers were concentrated in two southern Douglas County areas. One was centered ten miles east of Glendale and the other five miles west. The latter extended northeast to Canyonville. There were other scat-

tered occurrences of gold mining in the County. Ditches and reservoirs for placer mining comprise virtually all the surviving evidence. Nine ditches are located within the Cow Creek canyon between Glendale and Riddle; four are located east of Glendale, and this lower end of "China Ditch" is eight miles northeast of Myrtle Creek. The Victory Placer Mine (qv.) and the Hackler Heights Placer Mine (qv. Hydrologic Systems of Southern Douglas County) are the only resources with structures or mining equipment surviving.

Copper and silver were often extracted from the same ore. Mining for this ore was concentrated in an area north of Myrtle Creek to an area south of Canyonville. A few mines were isolated in the southern County. The Silver Peak Mine (qv.) and the Banfield Mine (qv.) are the only workings with above-ground evidence. The former is south of Canyonville near the summit of Silver Butte and the latter is an isolated mine south of Tiller.

Nickel has been mined and processed at only one site which is west of Riddle. The site, operated by M. A. Hanna Company, is the only productive nickel mine and refining operation in the United States. The ore is excavated from open cuts at the top of "Old Piney" and carried down the mountain via tram. It is refined at the mountain's base. According to the Company, all historic resources of mining and refining at the site have been disassembled.

Mercury or quicksilver was mined and refined in four western areas of the County. The Elkhead Mine, five miles east of Yoncalla, and the Buena Vista (Umpqua) and Maud S. Mines, ten miles northeast of Tiller, are identified in this survey. The Bonanza Mine, the largest producer in the County, was inventoried in 1976 for the State Historic Preservation Office.

Two clay pits and an oil well were inventoried. The first pit, located adjacent to the Elkhead mine, was the source of clay for the mine's brick resort. The Union Gap clay pit, located one mile south of Oakland, was the clay source for the brick from which many of the City's historic buildings were built. The "Oakland Well", drilled in 1926, is adjacent to the Union Gap clay pit. It is one of three pre-1930 wells drilled in the County, and the only one that can be located with accuracy.

Architectural Attributes

Gold mines represented in this inventory were placer operations that relied on large quantities of water at high pressure to wash gold bearing gravels from ledges and through a sluice box. Water was diverted from streams high along mountainsides and carried in ditches above the ledges and then dropped through riveted iron pipe. The water exited at a small orifice at the bottom as a high pressure stream. Sheds, bunkhouses, blacksmith shops and other related buildings were situated around the placer site. Only two of the thirteen gold mines in this inventory have any surviving buildings or mining equipment at the site (qv. Victory Mine and Hacklers Heights). The others are identified by ditches, reservoirs and washed placers (qv. Hydrologic Systems of Southern Douglas County).

Recognizable buildings at the Victory Mine (first worked in 1854) are a house and two small miners' cabins. The house is a crudely constructed one story gable structure with a loft. It is supported with nine hewn posts set upright and joined at the eave line with rabbets and dadoes to hewn beams. The walls are board and batten. The miners' cabins are very small, rectangular, gabled structures of box construction. The house and cabins are dilapidated and probably the oldest surviving dwellings associated with mining in the County.

The Hackler Heights Placer Mine is the only placer with virtually all of the hydrologic system in place. The ditch, reservoir, iron pipe and washed placer are clearly visible. The pipe, still attached, runs from the outlet box at the reservoir to the placer site. Only the giant nozzle is missing from the end of the pipe.

The identified ditches are usually one to three miles in length. One, however, stretched 18 miles along a mountainside (qv. "China Ditch" in Hydrologic Systems of Southern Douglas County). The ditches were dug by hand usually to a depth of two feet and were five feet wide at the top and three at the bottom. They descended at a rate of 40 feet per mile. Reservoir dimensions varied with the quantity of water available and terrain.

The Silver Peak Mine was the largest producer of copper ore in the County, and the Banfield Mine was the second. Evidence of the former consists of a large tailings dump that appears as a buff patch near the summit of Silver

Butte. The dump is recognizable from a distance in the Middle Creek basin. At the site an adit and the cast iron remains of a large pump are evident. Pulleys on the pump are approximately six feet in diameter and 18 inches wide at the belt surface. Evidence at the Banfield Mine includes a bunkhouse, two cabins, reservoir, roller mill and two adits. The bunkhouse and cabins are gabled, rectangular structures of stacked log construction built for the homestead requirements in c. 1910. All three are dilapidated. The reservoir is approximately five acre feet in size. The resources at the Banfield Mine have little interpretive value separately because they are in poor condition, but together they represent the only known copper and silver mines on private property.

Structures and objects at the three surveyed mercury mines are in greater abundance than at other types of mines. The bunkhouse and cabins (c. 1920's) at the Elkhead Mine are utilitarian in appearance. The former is 100 by 20 feet, one story and gabled. It is typical of the construction techniques of the period. A brick retort (Elkhead Retort, qv.) is also located at the site although it has not been in service since 1918. This is the only wood fired Scott furnace found during the survey. Other more recent structures and objects are evident at the site.

The sites of the other two mercury mines (qv. Buena Vista [Umpqua] and Maude S. Mines) are also occupied with a retort, crusher, ore bin and dump shed. Equipment at this site is of a similar vintage as that found at the Elkhead mine, with the exception of the Scott furnace. Wooden sheds and other structures were constructed of sawn lumber and timbers and fastened with nails, spikes or bolts. No equipment was found at the nearby Maude S. Mine. According to DOGMI in Geology and Mineral Resources of Douglas County, Oregon, 1972, the ore from this mine was treated at the Buena Vista Mine.

There are no structures or objects remaining at the clay pit sites. A steel casing surrounded by a concrete pad is the only visible remnant at the "Oakland Well".

Significance

In general, the historic resources identified in this inventory are significant to the County and some to the state. The identified gold mines represented the many placers that produced more than 60 per cent of the 64,000

ounces extracted in the County.⁷ According to one estimate, all mines in Douglas County produced approximately one-tenth of the total estimated production of southwestern Oregon between c. 1853 and 1900. The Victory Mine (c. 1856 - c. 1950) is significant to the State because of its early start-up date, length of production, remaining structures and adjudicated water rights. The Hackler Heights Mine is also significant to the State as a virtually complete hydrologic system for placer mining.

The Banfield Mine (c. 1900) was the second greatest producer of copper, yielding a total of 10,400 pounds. The above ground structures and objects together are significant to the County.

Nickel Mountain (qv.) on which the present Hanna Nickel Mine is situated "is the only productive nickel mine in the United States."⁸ The site is significant to the nation because it is the only working deposit and to the state and County as a major contribution to the economic base. The deposit was first noticed in 1865, but mining did not occur until the 1880's. Large scale refining began in 1954.

The mercury mines identified in this inventory represent two of the three mines in the County. (The other mine was surveyed for the State Historic Preservation Office in 1976.) Both mines are significant to the County for their economic contribution and as examples of surviving structures and objects associated with mercury mining. The Elkhead Mine Retort (qv.) is the only surviving example of a Scott furnace used for distilling mercury in the County. Significance is also derived from the Elkhead mine's association with the Rev. A. L. J. Todd, a notable Donation Land Claimant, circuit rider, potter and miner.

Both inventoried clay pits are historically important to the County only. Their development is closely associated with the development of the Elkhead Mine and the City of Oakland. The pit site near Oakland (qv. Union Gap Clay Pit) was one of the larger brick and tile manufacturing operations in the County. Clay products were exported from the site by rail car.

The "Oakland Well" is of historic interest only to the County. It was never in production and therefore never yielded an economic benefit to the local economy.

COMMERCE AND TRADE

A total of seven structures, two objects and one site relating to the Commerce and Trade theme are included in this inventory. Four of these structures and the site represent inns and other similar uses. A tavern, blacksmith shop and garage are the three remaining structures. Two signs painted on the sides of barns are the identified objects.

Spatial Distribution

Location adjacent to a major through transportation route was the major similarity of these resources. The house on the A. F. Brown Farm was reportedly a tavern on a territorial road which is now the Goodrich Highway. The Boswell Springs Resort (qv.) was constructed beside the O&C Railroad and now Old Highway 99. Four other resources were also sited adjacent to major historic routes now occupied by Old Highway 99. The "Reston Stage House" on the Arthur Johnson Farm (qv.) was located on the old Coos Bay Wagon Road (qv.). Only the Charles Hatfield Blacksmith Shop was not situated on a major through transportation route. It is located east of Melrose on the Old Melrose Road.

Only two signs extolling the virtues of a product were found during the survey. The largest is painted on the Clarence Springer Barn (qv.), which is located adjacent to Old Highway 99 approximately two miles northeast of Glendale. The other and smaller sign is also painted on a barn adjacent to the Highway. This latter one is located approximately two miles north of Yoncal-1a.

Architectural Attributes and Relative Scarcity

The inventoried structures of this theme represent four types of structures: house, store, barn and garage. The Reston Stage House (qv. Johnson, Arthur/Farm) and the Deer Park Inn were constructed in the Transitional Box style. The Inn is the more ornate and finely crafted structure. It is also more ornate than most of the other inventoried houses in the Transitional Box

style. The stage house, on the other hand, illustrates well the functional features of a farmhouse in the County. Its predominant feature is the large one story veranda that provides out-of-doors shelter on three elevations. The barn was an integral part of the commercial enterprise carried on at this site. It provided shelter for the stage horses and pack animals. The through drive created a sheltered work area for hostlers. The barn is one of a few barns in the inventory supported with sawn post and beams which are joined in the mortise and tenon technique.

The Stanton Park log cabin was the last dwelling identified in this theme. It was one of approximately twenty cabins of the Dodge Camp. Its method of construction mirrors that of shelters constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) in the 1920's. The camp was one of the first of its kind on Old Highway 99 in the Canyonville area. This surviving cabin is the only structure in the inventory constructed in the rugged CCC method.

The Charles Hatfield Blacksmith Shop (qv.) and the Andrew Jacques Service Station (qv.) are of different designs and periods, but both housed shops that serviced vehicles. The blacksmith shop, located in the Melrose area, is a small, barn-like structure. It is rectangular with a gabled roof and a drive from end to gable end. Sawn posts and beams support the buildings which are joined with mortice and tenons. This is the only known surviving blacksmith shop in the County. The rectangular service station was built in the 1920's with two hipped roofs extending over the pump island. The building is of balloon construction, sided with shiplap. It is one of the earliest service stations in rural southern Douglas County and is the only surviving station of the period in the inventory.

The first Boswell Springs Resort Hotel, c. 1870's, was fashioned in the Classic Revival style. This structure was destroyed by fire in 1901. The replacement hotel was disassembled, and a third structure, used for overflow, stands dilapidated. Nothing architecturally interesting remains at the site.

The Azalea General Store (qv.) is a rectangular two story gabled building. It is the only retail store building and the only structure with a facade in the inventory. The balloon construction method by which it is framed is typical of the other buildings of the same period. The second floor was both a living quarter for the owner and a hotel.

Significance

The ten resources of the Commerce and Trade theme illustrate the structures and a site that provided services and goods to both travelers and the local populace. The objects are examples of early highway advertisements. They are significant to the County for their relative scarcity with respect to all other surviving resources in the County. Four of the structures complement resources of the transportation theme and present a clearer picture of travel in and through the County.

Specifically, the Reston Stage House and the A. F. Brown House are significant to the County and the State. The Stage House is located on the Coos Bay Wagon Road, which was a major route between the coast and the interior. The method of travel along this route made this structure an integral part of the early transit system.

The A. F. Brown House (a tavern) was also an integral part of the public transportation system of the territorial road that follows the present-day Goodrich Highway. This was the main north-south route through the County from the 1850's to the 1880's. The Brown House is also important for having been owned by Alonzo F. Brown, a notable entrepreneur of southern Oregon.

Five of the resources were inns providing accommodations to travelers. The oldest of these was Boswell Springs Resort and the latest Dodge Camp (Stanton Park Cabin). Deer Park Inn is the oldest structure and the Reston Stage House and Azalea Store (built about the same time) were second and third.

APPENDIX A

METHODOLOGY

This inventory is a list of sites, structures and objects that possess historic significance as measured against criteria set forth by the National Parks System for the National Register of Historic Places. The inventory process spanned fourteen months beginning July, 1981. It began with familiarization of the County's and region's written histories. After reviewing United States Geological Survey maps and historic maps, subareas for the survey were delineated according to subdrainages, community boundaries, major transportation routes and waterways.

Interviews with the County's Planning Advisory Committees (PACs) provided both a list of probable resources that local citizens believe historically significant and a list of individuals who possessed a knowledge of local history.

A list of probable resources was created for each subarea from those identified by PACs, individuals, written histories, maps, historic pictures and governmental agencies. A survey regime for each subarea was then outlined and followed in the field with variations for resources that were not recognized by any of the previously mentioned sources. Care was taken to note and avoid duplicating resources inventoried in the 1974 Coastal Management Survey and the 1976 Statewide Inventory, survey or resources listed on the National Register. Additional information from knowing individuals was gleaned and supplemented with researched particulars from written material. Information on the inventory sheets is the product of the survey and research.

Inventory sheets for each resource are filed by township, range and section, and cross-referenced by name and by tax account number. Linear resources that span multiple townships or ranges are filed at the beginning of the inventory with zeros instead of by township, range and section notations. Resources located on multiple properties or on properties without a County assigned tax account number are given a control number. These numbers range between 1 and 65.

Mapping is done on inch to the mile General Highway Map, Oregon Department of Transportation, 1979. Dots represent sites of this inventory. Trian-

gles are resources of the 1976 survey. Open circles with a crosshatches are resources of the 1974 survey, and a closed square are resources on the National Register. Each of the mapped resource symbols is identified with a tax account number. Some, such as O&C Railroad bridges and tunnels, are given control numbers beginning with the number "1" because they do not have County tax account numbers.

APPENDIX B

RECOMMENDATIONS

There are two recommendations that surface from this inventory and analysis. The first concerns future survey methods and the second historic districts.

The purpose of any survey is to create an inventory of retrievable information for analysis. Retrieval of information should be both quick and accurate while controlling for variables. Basic control variables for a historic resource analysis might include, among other things, the theme, year built, builder, location and style. This method of analysis with the suggested SHPO format is neither quick nor especially accurate when a large number of resources are examined because the information is hidden in the suggested paragraph format.

It is recommended that basic data for future inventories be recorded in a format that is easily loaded and retrieved from a computer. The format used for the Oregon Coastal Conservation and Development Commission Historic Sites and Buildings Inventory in 1974 is an example of such a format. A number should follow each variable, as in this example:

When basic data is recorded in this format, it can be loaded into a computer using the numeric value by a keypunch operator. More detailed biographic or architectural information about the resource should still be explained in paragraph form on the inventory sheet.

A second recommendation involves five rural areas with six to ten historic resources, each of which are in close proximity and are of a common theme or themes. It is recommended that the Historic Resources Review Committee review the resources in the communities of Wilbur, Stephens, Gardiner, Brockway, and on the Winston Section Road to determine whether the resources comprise a

district according to the Committee's adopted criteria. The resources and area within the communities should be protected by ordinance if the Committee finds that they are, in fact, a district.


