

Description of Physical and or Landscape Features: Ada Grange Hall is a 1 story, frame, side-gabled, vernacular building that encompasses a modified rectangular plan. The front elevation faces west (Canary Rd is north of the building), and the façade is asymmetrical with one door at each corner (enclosed porch at the northwest entrance and ramp at the southwest entrance) and three 1:1 vinyl windows in between. The building has a concrete foundation and is clad with T-111 siding; the gable roof is asphalt shingled and has slight overhanging eaves. The building is located in a rural area of Westlake and sits on a .25 acre lot with a gravel drive connecting to Canary Rd. West of the Grange Hall is a small, front-gabled, wood-frame building once used as a junior grange hall.					
Statement of Significance: [Required only for Intensive Level Surveys] Built in 1918, Ada Grange Hall is an example of local vernacular architecture with its simple rectangular plan and gable roof. The building maintains a low degree of historic integrity due to a large-scale renovation in the 1980s in which the exterior bathrooms were enclosed, dining room and kitchen space were added, vinyl windows replaced some of the originals, and the exterior of the building was re-sided in T-111 siding, likely altering the building's original fenestration. As a result of these alterations, the building is not eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. The building appears to be in good condition; the lot on which the hall sits has changed very little over time and still contains the group's original Juvenile Grange building. As an organization, Ada Grange #510 was established in 1918, during a period of high grange formation and membership in Lane County. As a simple vernacular building, Ada Grange Hall represents the most common type of grange hall in Lane County.



Description of Physical and or Landscape Features: Central Grange Hall is a 1 ½ story, frame, front-gabled, Craftsman building that encompasses a modified rectangular plan. The front elevation faces southeast toward Central Road, and the façade is asymmetrical with a central door inside a recessed porch with a wheelchair ramp. A smaller front-gabled wing sits to the south of the front entrance. The building has a concrete foundation and is clad with wood shiplap siding; the gable roof is sheathed in corrugated metal and has wide overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends and large brackets. All windows are 1:1 and are of wood and vinyl construction. The building sits on a .54 acre lot with several large trees and a gravel drive that circles the building and connects with Central Road.				
Statement of Significance: [Required only for Intensive Level Surveys] Central Grange Hall is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A for its association with the Grange Movement in Lane County, Oregon. Having local significance in the areas of Social History and Agriculture, the building represents the combined efforts of a local agricultural organization to promote the welfare of society and to actively support farmers' interests and individual rights. Built c.1920, Central Grange Hall is an example of Craftsman architecture. The building maintains a moderate degree of historic integrity, and appears to be in good condition. The lot on which the hall sits has also changed very little over time. As an organization, Central Grange #360 was established in 1911, during a period of high grange formation and membership in Lane County. Central Grange Hall is one of three extant Craftsman grange halls in Lane County (the other two are Lowell Grange Hall in Lowell and Four Oaks Grange Hall in Eugene).



Description of Physical and or Landscape Features: Coburg Community Grange Hall is a 2 story, frame, vernacular building with a hipped roof and modified rectangular plan. The front elevation faces southeast toward E. Mill Street, and the façade is symmetrical with a hipped-roof porch on the first story. The building has a concrete foundation and is clad with wood shiplap siding. All windows are vinyl replacements (6:6 and sliding). The hipped roof is asphalt shingled and has overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends. A small shed-roofed addition exists on the northwest elevation. A paved parking strip lies between the front of the building and E. Mill Street. Coburg Community Grange Hall is located in a residential area of Coburg, just east of the town's main commercial district.					
Statement of Significance: [Required only for Intensive Level Surveys] Built in 1940, Coburg Community Grange Hall is an example of local vernacular architecture. The building maintains only a moderate degree of historic integrity, as all original windows have been exchanged for vinyl replacements and a newer wheelchair ramp obscures a portion of the original front porch. As these are reversible alterations, the building is potentially eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. The lot on which the hall sits has changed very little over time, and the building appears to be in good condition. As an organization, Coburg Grange #535 was established in 1915, during a period of high grange formation and membership in Lane County. As a simple vernacular building, Coburg Community Grange Hall represents the most common type of grange hall in Lane County.



Description of Physical and or Landscape Features: Creswell Grange Hall is a 2 story, frame, vernacular building with a hipped roof. The front elevation faces south towards Oregon Avenue, and the façade is symmetrical with a central doorway enclosed by a small gable-roofed porch. The building has a concrete foundation, no windows, and is clad in corrugated metal. The hipped roof is asphalt shingled and has overhanging eaves with slightly exposed rafter ends. The east elevation contains a small one-story, rectangular addition with a gable roof and two doors on the south elevation. The building is located on Oregon Avenue, Creswell's main commercial street.					
Statement of Significance: [Required only for Intensive Level Surveys] Built in 1938, Creswell Grange Hall is an example of local vernacular architecture. The building appears to be in good condition, but maintains a low degree of historic integrity as it has been entirely re-clad in corrugated metal siding, obliterating the building's original windows and wood shiplap siding. As a result, the building is not eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (although further investigation is required to determine whether the original wood shiplap remains beneath the corrugated metal siding). The lot on which the hall sits, however, has changed very little over time. As an organization, Creswell Grange #496 was established in 1913; a simple vernacular building, Creswell Grange Hall represents the most common type of grange hall in Lane County.




Description of Physical and or Landscape Features: Crow Grange Hall is a 1 story, frame, side-gabled, Ranch-style building that encompasses a modified rectangular plan. The front elevation faces northeast toward Territorial Road, and the façade is asymmetrical with a door at the southeast corner and a row of individual sliding aluminum windows between the door and the northeast corner. The building has a concrete foundation, and is clad with asbestos siding; the front door is framed by a corrugated plastic shelter. The gable roof is asphalt shingled and has very little overhanging eaves. Because the hall is built into a hill, the northeast (front) elevation appears to be one story, while the southwest (rear) elevation appears to be two. A sidewalk runs from the front entrance to an additional entrance on the southeast side of the building. Crow Grange Hall is located in a rural area and sits on a 1.88 acre lot with a small storage shed in back (southwest) and a paved parking lot in front (northeast).					
Statement of Significance: [Required only for Intensive Level Surveys] Crow Grange Hall is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A for its association with the Grange Movement in Lane County, Oregon. Having local significance in the areas of Social History and Agriculture, the building represents the combined efforts of a local agricultural organization to promote the welfare of society and to actively support farmers' interests and individual rights. Built in 1951, Crow Grange Hall exemplifies a simplified version of the Ranch style of architecture popular during the 1950s and 1960s; the building exhibits a rectangular plan, side-gabled roof, and a small eave overhang - all of which are typical Ranch elements. Crow Grange Hall maintains a high degree of historic integrity, as very little exterior work has been done to alter its basic appearance. The lot on which the hall sits has also changed very little over time. The building itself is in fair condition; its structural supports and foundation appear to be well maintained, although the roof is in a marked state of disrepair. As an organization, Crow Grange #450 was established in 1911, during a period of high grange formation and membership in Lane County; initially the group met in the local I.O.O.F. Hall until the maintenance and safety of that building became an issue, leading to the construction of the current hall in 1951. As one of the only historic Ranch style grange halls in the county, Crow Grange Hall symbolizes a shift in the architectural trends of Lane County granges.

The building is located in a rural area and sits on a 6.63 acre lot with a large paved parking lot and gravel driveway between the hall and Row River Road. Several large trees stand just south of the building and along the east side of the driveway/parking lot.





Statement of Significance: [Required only for Intensive Level Surveys] Four Oaks Grange Hall is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A for its association with the Grange Movement in Lane County, Oregon. Having local significance in the areas of Social History and Agriculture, the building represents the combined efforts of a local agricultural organization to promote the welfare of society and to actively support farmers' interests and individual rights. Built in 1917, Four Oaks Grange Hall exemplifies the Craftsman style of architecture popular between 1905 and 1930; the building exhibits a cross-shaped plan, cross-gabled roof, a wide eave overhang with exposed rafter ends and brackets, and a covered front porch with balustrade - all of which are typical Craftsman elements. Four Oaks Grange Hall maintains a high degree of historic integrity, as very little work has been done to alter its basic appearance, although vinyl windows have replaced the original wood windows. The lot on which the hall sits has also changed very little over time. The building itself is in good condition. As an organization, Four Oaks Grange #528 was established in 1914, during a period of high grange formation and membership in Lane County; initially the group met in the Bailey Hill schoolhouse until the current grange hall was completed in August of 1917. Description of Physical and or Landscape Features: Thurston Grange Hall is a two story, frame, barrel-roofed vernacular building with a simple rectangular plan. The front elevation of the hall faces south toward Thurston Road, and the façade is asymmetrical with no windows and a door in the southeast corner. The building has a concrete foundation and is clad in painted wood shiplap siding. A corrugated metal awning between the first and second stories covers a concrete patio that runs the length of the south elevation. Two dormers exist on either side (east and west) of the asphalt-shingled barrel roof. The east and west elevations also contain sliding aluminum windows at the first story, and the west elevation contains one exterior door. The hall is located on a .1 acre lot and shares a parking lot with a local convenience store, as it is located in a busy residential neighborhood of Springfield.					
Statement of Significance: [Required only for Intensive Level Surveys] Thurston Grange Hall is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A for its association with the Grange Movement in Lane County, Oregon. Having local significance in the areas of Social History and Agriculture, the building represents the combined efforts of a local agricultural organization to promote the welfare of society and to actively support farmers' interests and individual rights. Built as a community center in 1913, Thurston Grange Hall is an example of local vernacular architecture; the building maintains a high degree of historic integrity, as very little work as been done to alter its basic appearance. The lot on which the hall sits has also changed very little over time, although it is now adjacent to the parking lot of a local convenience store. The building itself is in good condition. As an organization, Thurston Grange #853 was established in 1936; the group adopted the community center for use as a grange hall the same year. While its vernacular styling is common among Lane County grange halls, Thurston Grange Hall is the only National Register eligible grange hall in Lane County with a barrel roof.

The gable and shed roofs are asbestos shingled, as is the gable roof of the front porch. Triangle Grange Hall is located at the top of a hill in rural Blachly and sits on a .35 acre lot next to Blachly School.				
Statement of Significance: [Required only for Intensive Level Surveys] Built in 1919, Triangle Grange Hall is an example of local vernacular architecture. The building maintains a low degree of historic integrity, as it has been entirely reclad in T-111 siding (possibly altering the original fenestration) and several windows have been exchanged for vinyl replacements. Because these changes significantly alter the building's original appearance, Triangle Grange Hall is not eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. The lot on which the hall sits has changed very little over time, and the building appears to be in good condition. As an organization, Triangle Grange #533 was established in 1915, during a period of high grange formation and membership in Lane County. As a fairly simple vernacular building, Triangle Grange Hall represents the most common type of grange hall in Lane County.



Statement of Significance: [Required only for Intensive Level Surveys] Walterville Grange Hall, also known as the George Millican Community Hall, is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A for its association with education in Lane County. The building maintains a high degree of historic integrity, as it has had relatively little work done to alter its basic appearance within the last fifty years (most significant alterations/additions were constructed between 1900 and 1951). The lot on which the hall sits has also changed very little over time, and the building itself appears to be in good condition. As an organization, Walterville Grange #416 was established in 1910, but fell dormant four years later. The group was reorganized in 1932 and began meeting in the Millican School in 1951 when the school was abandoned due to consolidation that year. 
