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# PROJECT OVERVIEW

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## 1. Introduction

A comprehensive inventory of the supply of existing outdoor recreation resources and facilities is an essential tool for outdoor recreation planning in the state of Oregon. Along with an understanding of recreation participation, inventory data can help recreation providers identify the need for additional outdoor recreational resources and facilities within their coverage areas. Towards this end, the 2001 Oregon Statewide Outdoor Recreational Resource/Facility Inventory Bulletin will serve as a planning tool for both public and private recreation providers in analyzing their own needs and establishing goals and priorities.

The last inventory of outdoor recreation resources and facilities in the state of Oregon was published in November of 1995. Recognizing a need for accurate statewide recreation resource and facility inventory data, the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) was awarded a matching Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) grant from the National Park Service for preparation of this bulletin. OPRD would like to acknowledge the support of the National Park Service Columbia Cascades Support Office staff for successful completion of this planning bulletin.

The 2001 Oregon Statewide Outdoor Recreational Resource/Facility Inventory is also an important part of the 2003-2007 Oregon Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP). A central component of this SCORP plan will be a quantitative comparison of the supply of existing recreation resources and facilities (information from this bulletin) with current outdoor recreation participation to identify recreational need. Recreational need is identified when the current level of recreation participation is found to exceed the current supply of recreation resources and facilities in a given area. The 2003-2007 Oregon SCORP will conduct such a recreational needs assessment for each of the 11 planning regions (see planning region map on page --) and statewide. In addition, 5-year needs assessments will be conducted using projected population increases for each region and statewide.

The basic framework for this inventory (e.g., resource and facility measurements and presentation of figures and tables) was patterned after the 1994 Florida SCORP Plan<sup>1</sup>. OPRD would like to acknowledge the quality recreational planning work being done by the State of Florida, Division of Recreation and Parks, Office of Park Planning.

The accuracy of this statewide inventory is essential to the 2003-2007 SCORP needs assessment process. As a result, considerable time and expense was allocated towards maximizing the inventory response for recreation providers across the state. The following section provides a description of this data collection process.

## 1.1 Data Collection

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The list of recreational resources and facilities measured in the 2001 Oregon Statewide Recreational Resource/Facility Inventory was developed after a review of the 1988-1998 Oregon Statewide Outdoor Recreation Facilities Supply Bulletin (released in November 1995), 1994 Florida SCORP Plan, and SCORP planning documents from other states. As part of this process, a set of resource and facility definitions were developed for use during data collection (see Appendix page ----). In addition, units of measurement for each resource and facility (e.g., hiking trails in linear miles, fishing piers in linear feet, and so forth) were determined based on the requirements of the needs assessment methodology included in the 2003-2007 Oregon SCORP planning process.

For ease of completion, 5 versions of the inventory questionnaire were used to gather recreational resources and facilities information across the state. A copy of the public-sector questionnaire and cover letter is included on page of the appendix. For larger agencies (e.g., U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, Oregon Parks & Recreation Department), custom computer spreadsheets were developed for large-scale data collection (an example is also included in the appendix on page \_\_\_\_).

Data collection for the 2001 Oregon Statewide Recreational Resource/Facility Bulletin was conducted over a period from November 13, 2000 to August 31, 2001. Each recreation provider was sent a cover letter and a copy of the appropriate Recreational Resource/Facility Inventory Questionnaire. A postage-paid return envelope was provided with each questionnaire mailing (and all follow-up mailings). A replacement questionnaire was mailed to providers who had not returned their questionnaires approximately four weeks after the initial inventory mailing. Approximately eight weeks after the initial mailing, a phone call was made to each recreation provider who had not returned a questionnaire. During the conversation, the provider's contact person and mailing address was verified. If the questionnaire was misplaced, another was mailed out. Finally, a phone call was made to each non-respondent during the week of July 30, 2001. Again, if the questionnaire was misplaced, another was mailed out. Recreational Resource/Facility Inventory Questionnaires received after August 31, 2001 are not included in this Bulletin.

Since many recreation areas have multiple ownership/management arrangements, it was necessary that each recreation provider understand which resources/facilities to report. To reduce the opportunity for over counting of facilities, the following note was included on each inventory questionnaire:

***IMPORTANT NOTE:*** Please provide information for only those resources/facilities within your jurisdiction or park. Each agency is responsible for reporting its own resources/facilities currently managed. If an agency owns a recreational parcel, but it is managed by another agency, the agency with management responsibility should report the resource/facilities (to avoid over reporting).

After receiving completed inventory questionnaires from each recreation provider, the reported data was checked for reporting accuracy. Follow-up phone calls were made when necessary to verify data accuracy.

In addition to inventory questionnaires, a number of other information sources were used to gather inventory data (e.g., private recreation directories, recreation resource publications state agency contacts, etc.) for this bulletin. For a complete listing of these information sources see page \_\_\_ of the appendix. As providers were identified, a number were interviewed by telephone to obtain additional information.

After inventory data for each recreation provider were verified for accuracy, the data was entered into a Microsoft Access database. This database was used to generate all figures and tables included in this bulletin. Recreational resource and facility inventory data was entered in the database for each county. County level data was combined for each planning regions and statewide for inventory information reported in this bulletin.

## **1.2 Recreation Provider Response**

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### 1.3 Major Recreation Suppliers Categories

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A wide range of public and private-sector recreation organizations provide recreational resources and facilities for use by the general public in Oregon. In an effort to summarize data for figures and tables in this bulletin, each recreation provider has been classified into one of eight major recreation supplier categories. Table 1.1 (below) lists these eight supplier categories and the specific recreational providers assigned to each category.

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# APPENDICES

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## RESOURCE AND FACILITY DEFINITIONS

**Outdoor Recreation Land:** Land acres available for public recreation use.

**Outdoor Recreation Water:** Lake, reservoir, and pond surface acres available for public recreation use.

**Surfaced Trail:** Includes a variety of trail surface types such as concrete, asphalt, paved rock, or wood chip surfaces.

**Unsurfaced Trail:** A recreational trail or path with a dirt/natural surface.

**Community Walking Trails/Paths:** Any pathway within or nearby a city or town designated for use by the general public, but not normally designated for use by motorized vehicles.

**Designated Motorized Trails-ATV and Motorcycle:** Trails marked specifically for use by ATV's and motorcycles (including dual sport and dirt bikes).

**Backcountry Roads (Unpaved):** Any unpaved roads through public or private lands, such as gravel logging roads which could be used for recreational purposes.

**Downhill Skiing Area (Lift capacity per hour):** The total number of skiers/snowboarders that a ski area's lift system can move to the top of a ski run per hour.

**Equipped Play Areas:** Children's playgrounds containing equipment such as swings, jungle gyms, and other play apparatus.

**Freshwater Beach Resources:** Freshwater sandy beach areas are found on water bodies such as lakes, ponds, rivers, etc. Freshwater beach resources include freshwater sandy beach areas within a recreation provider's jurisdiction or park (including freshwater tidal zones).
