CHAPTER .....

AN ACT

Relating to school safety; and declaring an emergency.

**Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

**SECTION 1.** (1) The Task Force on School Safety is established, consisting of 14 members as follows:

- (a) The Superintendent of State Police or the superintendent's designee.
- (b) The Director of the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training or the director's designee.
- (c) The Governor's Public Safety Policy Advisor.
- (d) The Governor's Education Policy Advisor.
- (e) The President of the Senate shall appoint one member from among members of the Senate.
- (f) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint one member from among members of the House of Representatives.
- (g) The Governor shall appoint eight members as follows:
  - (A) A member of the Oregon State Sheriffs' Association;
  - (B) A member of the Oregon Association Chiefs of Police;
  - (C) A member of the Oregon Fire Chiefs Association;
  - (D) A member of the Oregon Education Association;
  - (E) A member of the Oregon School Employees Association;
  - (F) A member of the Oregon School Boards Association;
  - (G) A member of the Oregon Association of Education Service Districts; and
  - (H) A member of the Confederation of Oregon School Administrators.
- (2) Members of the Legislative Assembly appointed to the task force are nonvoting members of the task force and may act in an advisory capacity only.
- (3) The task force shall:
  - (a)(A) Develop a request for proposals to be published by the Department of State Police for hiring a vendor to create a database of floor plans for all schools within the state, accessible to authorized users via the Internet; and
  - (B) Make recommendations to the Department of State Police for the development of administrative rules governing the database, including but not limited to:
    - (i) Specifying the persons and agencies that may have access to the database;
    - (ii) Identifying the persons or agencies that will maintain the database; and
    - (iii) Regulating the manner in which database records are added or modified;

(b) Examine models of existing education and training programs for law enforcement officials, other first responders and school employees in the area of school safety and incident response; and

(c) Examine models for existing protocols for school safety and incident response and consider whether standardized statewide school safety and incident response protocols would be appropriate.

(4) A majority of the voting members of the task force constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business.

(5) Official action by the task force requires the approval of a majority of the voting members of the task force.

(6) The task force shall elect one of its members to serve as chairperson and one of its members to serve as vice chairperson.

(7) If there is a vacancy for any cause, the appointing authority shall make an appointment to become immediately effective.

(8) The task force shall meet at times and places specified by the call of the chairperson or of a majority of the voting members of the task force.

(9) The task force may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the task force.

(10) The task force shall submit a report concerning the floor plan database in the manner provided by ORS 192.245, and may include recommendations for legislation, to an interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to the judiciary as appropriate no later than September 1, 2014.

(11) The Department of State Police shall provide staff support to the task force.

(12) Members of the task force who are not members of the Legislative Assembly are not entitled to compensation, but may be reimbursed for actual and necessary travel and other expenses incurred by them in the performance of their official duties in the manner and amounts provided for in ORS 292.495. Claims for expenses incurred in performing functions of the task force shall be paid out of funds appropriated to the Department of State Police for purposes of the task force.

(13) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, are directed to assist the task force in the performance of its duties and, to the extent permitted by laws relating to confidentiality, to furnish such information and advice as the members of the task force consider necessary to perform their duties.

**SECTION 2.** Section 1 of this 2014 Act is repealed on the date of the convening of the 2017 regular session of the Legislative Assembly as specified in ORS 171.010.

**SECTION 3.** This 2014 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2014 Act takes effect on its passage.

# Task Force on School Safety

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## **Outcomes:**

- ✚ Develop a request for proposals to be published by the Department of State Police for hiring a vendor to create a database of floor plans for all schools within the state, accessible to authorized users via the Internet
- ✚ Make recommendations to the Department of State Police for the development of administrative rules governing the database, including but not limited to:
  - Specifying the persons and agencies that may have access to the database
  - Identifying the persons or agencies that will maintain the database
  - Regulating the manner in which database records are added or modified
- ✚ Examine models of existing education and training programs for law enforcement officials, other first responders and school employees in the area of school safety and incident response
- ✚ Examine models for existing protocols for school safety and incident response and consider whether standardized statewide school safety and incident response protocols would be appropriate.

# Task Force on School Safety

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## *Operating Rules:*

- ✚ A majority of voting members constitutes a quorum
- ✚ Official action requires the approval of a majority
- ✚ Task Force elects one chairperson and one vice chairperson
- ✚ Vacancies shall be filled by the appointing authority
- ✚ Meetings are held by the call of the Chair person or a majority of the members
- ✚ Appointed members of the legislative assembly are non-voting members
- ✚ Task Force is repealed on the date the 2017 legislature convenes

In March of 2008, a collaborative effort began among various professionals to create a structured and consistent forum that addressed planning and coordination around acts of violence and/or threats within the school setting. One of the primary goals focused on opening the lines of communications between agencies thereby allowing constructive planning to begin. This effort originally involved three agencies and has grown to include participation by more than 14 different agencies. It is this commitment by local community partners that has been the crux of our group. The partnership has grown to include representation and/or some form of participation from all schools within Hood River County. Other agencies that have or are participating in our planning meetings include: Hood River Juvenile Department, Hood River Sheriff's Office, Hood River Police Department, Oregon State Police, Hood River Emergency Management, Hood River 911, Horizon Christian School, New Dawn Security, Hood River Fire Department, Hood River Health Department, Hood River Counseling & Mid-Columbia Center for Living.

As planning meetings progressed our goals focused on the following:

- To work towards open and effective communication among agencies during a crisis situation. This generated discussions about designating a communication channel with the school radios to allow direct communication access to law enforcement in an emergency.
- Exploring the possibility of law enforcement and fire having access to the school district's camera systems for both emergency and training situations.
- Allowing law enforcement access to all school buildings in the event of an emergency.
- Law enforcement and fire personnel coordinating with school principals to a conduct walk-through of each school to allow better familiarization of the buildings.
- To increase awareness of current practices and recommendations for response to an active shooter and/or threats within the schools.
- To review and unify the current lockdown procedures utilized at each school.

By February, 2014, almost six years after the effort began, 49 meetings and/or work sessions have taken place with solid agency representation. Through these meetings there has been significant progress in relation to refining our initial goals as well as identifying many new goals. Our accomplished goals include the following:

- Emergency radios, along with training and testing protocol, were placed in all Hood River County Schools and Horizon Christian School. These radios allow for direct communication from the school to the 911 center in the event of an emergency.
- Executed an Intergovernmental Agreement that allows the 911 communication center to access the school camera systems in emergency situation and for training purposes.
- Direct access to HRCSD buildings by law enforcement in emergency situations – master keys checked out to supervisory staff within local law enforcement.
- Law enforcement collaboration with school principals for ongoing building reviews and safety recommendations.
- The development of Active Shooter Response for law enforcement.
- Consistent lockdown/lock-in procedures identified through collaborative efforts from law enforcement and school district personnel.
- The development of a threat level system to include consistent practices utilized within our local response area and surrounding support agencies.
- An emergency response binder has been developed and checked out to all law enforcement officers within Hood River County as well as Oregon State Police, 911 command center, Fire

Command Officers & Emergency Management. The binders were developed through our group effort and include the following documentation:

- Emergency phone numbers for school district personnel & other available resources within the community that could assist in emergencies.
  - Lockdown procedures for each school
  - Architecturally drafted color floor plans to include camera locations for each school
  - Aerial photos of each school with noted road closures as designated by each fire district
- Electronic versions of the floor plans for all Hood River County School District are available for the 911 command centers 3D mapping system.
  - 2008 FEMA funded full-scale active shooter drill at a local school that encompassed an independent review. An after action report was generated that included areas to be improved and areas of strength.
  - 2012 – FEMA funded communications drill and table top exercise with an independent review. Improvement plan from the 2008 drill was tested and after action report was again generated.
  - Group members participated in various trainings relating to professional development in this area. This included a coordinated training for group members on the Mass Causality Incident Plan (MCI) presented by the local fire department.
  - Regular lockdown/lock-in exercises that often include law enforcement participation and feedback.
  - Multiple law enforcement trainings on active shooter response with area law enforcement agencies working together.

Our accomplished goals are continually reviewed and therefore always ongoing. Our group focus has progressed into planning around what happens after the threat has been neutralized. Hood River County has a Mass Causality Incident plan, which was tested in 2013 as part of combined dam breach and active shooter drill. During that scenario the Hood River Fire Department and Rural Fire Departments simulated triage and transportation of students to Providence Hood River Memorial Hospital. The hospital simulated treatment of 10 patients. During this scenario Emergency Management simulated operations of a command center and joint information center for public information. The school district, health department, hospital and sheriff's office simulated a news release for the active shooter incident. The after action plan gave our group objectives to work on and ideas for improvement.

The group is drafting a unified command flow chart for an active shooter incident. In that chart we have identified planning needs and are working on those objectives now. Some of our current objectives include the following:

- The formation of a subcommittee with a goal of identifying and addressing the logistics and challenges for law enforcement associated with a reunification and evacuation effort in a given emergency occurring at a school. This includes identifying agencies that will have specific roles in the event of an emergency situation.
- The development of a school district evacuation and reunification document that specifically addresses the school district's response and management of personnel and students in an emergency.

- The revision of current lockdown/lock-in procedures to include a standardized threat level system that accounts for varying situations.
- The formation of a subcommittee to identify a pre-planned communication protocol that would be included in the emergency response binders as a reference for effective communication and role identification during an emergency. This would include how lockdown/lock-in are communicated from law enforcement to the schools and how it is communicated to school personnel. This would also account for a protocol to end a lockdown/lock-in and would pre-define radio channels for emergencies, available channels for use and different IC section channels.
- The development and/or identification of response services to include mental health support services.

This process that began in 2008 continues to evolve as new ideas and agencies become part of the planning. While objectives continue to be reviewed, the group planning and focus has been on various phases of an incident. Currently the group has shifted focus from an immediate threat being present to the aftermath of an emergency situation. We are fortunate in our community to have a solid commitment from various professionals and agencies to continue our efforts. It is this commitment that has made our efforts and accomplishments possible.

# WASPC Mapping Program (CIPMS)

## Critical Incident Planning and Mapping System (CIPMS)

**Background:** WASPC has completed the legislatively mandated digital mapping of all K-12 schools in Washington state. The Legislature funded **\$21 million** (over 11 years), using the **Capital Budget** to complete the K-12 system. (There are approximately 2,100 schools in WA, and an estimated 700 schools have actually been mapped more than once, due to new construction and remodeling.) Additionally, federal homeland security funding has been used to map the Legislative Building, SeaTac Airport, CenturyLink and Safeco Fields, hospitals, courthouses, and other public and critical infrastructure sites. (RCW 36.28A.060)

The mapping system provides detailed information to first responders, including tactical pre-plans, satellite and geospatial imagery, interior and exterior photos, floor plans, staging areas, hazardous materials, utility shut-offs, and evacuation routes. Every law enforcement and fire department in the state can access this information to better respond to emergencies at schools and other mapped facilities.

The state's community college system has also been mapped using the capital budget, but Washington has not yet mapped its 4-year institutions.

**Operating Budget:** The Legislature has funded the ongoing operation of the system at **\$500,000 per year** (\$1,000,000 for FY 2013-2015). This funding covers a continuing 1.5 FTEs at WASPC and all Application Service Provider (ASP) costs.

## Real Incident Uses

**Spokane School Shooter:** At Lewis and Clark High School, a school shooting incident resolved without loss of life. A 4 1/2 minute video describing how the system was used in this incident and other videos are available at

**Vancouver Bomb Threat:** At Evergreen High School, the mapping system was used by three schools, fire department, and CRESA, the dispatch agency, to address bomb threat / suspicious devices incident. Pre-planning effectively executed - for example, students at the HS were not allowed to use their cars to evacuate; they were escorted to the pre-planned evacuation spot and bussed to safety from there.

**Cowlitz County Fire:** During a warehouse fire on the Columbia River in Kelso, emergency officials used the program to estimate the extent of a possible chemical release to plan the evacuation of neighborhoods near the fire, in the event that a storage tank caught fire.

**Thurston County Courthouse Threat:** An angry citizen completed a call with the Assessor's Office with a verbal threat to shoot "everyone in the courthouse". Responding officers used site and floor plans provided from the system to plan and implement the lockdown, search, and evacuation of the three courthouse buildings.

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## Cost Determination

The mapping system uses an Internet-based software system known as Rapid Responder, provided under contract by Prepared Response, Inc. (PRI). It is a complex system which is carried on multiple servers, mirrored and regularly backed up, to ensure continued availability in an emergency.

Schools and other facility operators keep the information up-to-date by making changes directly to the system. For example, they change contact names and upload revised emergency plans directly to the site. The information is then immediately available to first responders. WASPC supports over 7,000 first responder and over 7,000 site users in their use of the system by providing regular training around the state and customer service via a toll-free number, email, and Webinar classes. Public schools and responders are not charged for the use of the system, and can have an unlimited number of users.

New and remodeled sites are added to the system at a one-time cost of \$0.16 per square foot. As an example, a small elementary school of 40,000 square feet would cost \$6,400. WASPC's contract with PRI covers the software licensing and maintenance to sustain the system, for up to 2,500 sites in Washington. If Oregon sites are added, WASPC will need funding to cover its administrative costs and the ASP fee for ongoing training and other administrative costs for Oregon facilities and responders.

## Incident Reporting in Washington State

Since the addition of a reporting capability for drills and incidents in response to SB 5097 (2007), schools have reported nearly 50,000 drills, exercises and actual incidents via the system. Lockdowns, bomb threats, medical emergencies, and fire incidents (internal and external to facilities) are common occurrences that schools are better prepared to deal with because of their involvement with the program.

## Strategy - Interlocal Agreement with Oregon State Agency

**Governmental Agency:** WASPC is defined in WA Statute as "a combination of units of local government", so it can enter into interlocal agreements with other government agencies, often without bidding or RFP processes. (RCW 36.28A.010)

**Adjacent States:** The WASPC Executive Board has authorized the Executive Director to enter into interlocal agreements with governmental agencies in adjoining states to operate the mapping program for schools or other facilities in those states and with those responders.

**Pilot schools:** One strategy for demonstrating the usefulness of the program would be to fund and implement the program in pilot schools in districts in rural and urban areas in various parts of Oregon. Capital budget funding worked well for this approach in Washington.

**RCW 36.28A.060**

**Statewide first responder building mapping information system — Creation — Data must be available to law enforcement, military, and fire safety agencies — Standards — Public disclosure exemption.**

(1) When funded, the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs shall create and operate a statewide first responder building mapping information system.

(2) All state agencies and local governments must utilize building mapping software that complies with the building mapping software standards established under RCW 36.28A.070 for any building mapped for this purpose after the statewide first responder building mapping information system is operational. If, prior to creation of the statewide building mapping information system, a local government has utilized building mapping software standards established under RCW 36.28A.070, the local government may continue to use its own building mapping system unless the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs provides funding to bring the local government's system in compliance with the standards established under RCW 36.28A.070.

(3) All state and local government-owned buildings that are occupied by state or local government employees must be mapped when funding is provided by the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs, or from other sources. Nothing in chapter 102, Laws of 2003 requires any state agency or local government to map a building unless the entire cost of mapping the building is provided by the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs, or from other sources.

(4) Once the statewide first responder building mapping information system is operational, all state and local government buildings that are mapped must forward their building mapping information data to the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs. All participating privately, federally, and tribally owned buildings may voluntarily forward their mapping and emergency information data to the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs. The Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs may refuse any building mapping information that does not comply with the specifications described in RCW 36.28A.070.

(5) Consistent with the guidelines developed under RCW 36.28A.070, the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs shall electronically make the building mapping information available to all state, local, federal, and tribal law enforcement agencies, the military department of Washington state, and fire departments.

(6) Consistent with the guidelines developed under RCW 36.28A.070, the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs shall develop building mapping software standards that must be used to participate in the statewide first responder building mapping information system.

(7) The Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs shall pursue federal funds to:

(a) Create the statewide first responder building mapping information system; and

(b) Develop grants for the mapping of all state and local government buildings in the order determined under RCW 36.28A.070.

(8) All tactical and intelligence information provided to the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs under chapter 102, Laws of 2003 is exempt from public disclosure as provided in RCW 42.56.240.

**Intent -- 2003 c 102:** "The legislature recognizes the extreme dangers present when the safety of our citizens requires first responders such as police and firefighters to evacuate and secure a building. In an

effort to prepare for responding to unintended disasters, criminal acts, and acts of terrorism, the legislature intends to create a statewide first responder building mapping information system that will provide all first responders with the information they need to be successful when disaster strikes. The first responder building mapping system in this act is to be developed for a limited and specific purpose and is in no way to be construed as imposing standards or system requirements on any other mapping systems developed and used for any other local government purposes." [2003 c 102 § 1.]
